MILLIONS OF BOOKS ISSUED TO SUPPORT BOLSHEVIST IDEAS

BUEHARST, July 20.—Figures received here summarizing the activities of the publishing business in Russia which is purely an enterprise of the Soviet state, indicate that a great effort is being made to convince the Russian people of the correctness of Bolshevik political, social and economic theories.

The Soviet publishing house issued from its presses in Moscow and put into circulation throughout Russia during the last twelve months no less than 11,500,000 volumes covering the fields of economics, politics, history and even fiction.

Aside from the obvious propaganda tendencies of the volumes on political and economic subjects, the Soviet historians have suffered because of its hostility to Bolshevik doctrines, and in many of the fiction volumes the endeavor has been to prove that opposition to Soviet doctrines has warped, limited or distorted individual lives.

London Zoo Gets Poison Gas Animal

(By Dominion News Service)

LONDON, July 20.—The latest acquisition to the famous London Zoo is an animal which uses poison gas for defence. No, the first guess is wrong, it is not a skunk, it is a millipede, so-called because the first person who tried to count his legs gave up after he had found one hundred, and guessed there must be a million at least. The millipede is the largest in captivity. It has just arrived from British East Africa. Its keeper is very proud of this exceptional specimen. He has given it a pet name "Milly," even though he has not yet discovered its sex; for reasons that will be made plain. At first he was undecided whether to call it "Milly" or "Pedro," but after his experiences he decided that the former would be more appropriate.

First he bestowed upon it quite a lot of painstaking arithmetic. He found that its body was composed of exactly sixty two segments—a calculation rendered somewhat difficult by the restless wriggling of the different compartments. Two pairs of legs per segment next gave a total of two hundred and forty eight legs—figures which he was not inclined to corroborate by the simple method of counting them one by one.

He was about to pass on to a calculation, based on Einstein's theory of relativity, of the total number of hairs on the total number of legs on the total number of segments, when he began to sniff an obnoxious gas which produced an irritation in the throat. Milly, it would seem, has no sympathy with abstruse arithmetical problems, and she was doing her best to gas the mathematician from certain glands of each segment—well, if you will have it, her foramina repugnatoris a fluid containing prussic acid was quietly exuding, staining the keeper's hand a beautiful shade of brown.

This is Milly's sole protection against enemies like birds and cats. It took her keeper somewhat by surprise, but merely gave him further interest in his pet. Two glands per segment, minus the first four, which don't possess any, gives a total of 114. The keeper then reached for another sheet of paper to continue his calculations. The next point to be decided was how much prussic acid would Milly exude per hour, how many Millys would be required to produce the acid on a paying basis supposing the cost of upkeep for Milly is three farthings a day. But at this point the calculations he came so complicated that the keeper decided it would be simple to discover how long it would take Milly to produce a sufficient quantity of prussic acid for a fatal dose.
