THE COOK'S CORNER

DEVILED CORN

2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1-2 cups milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-2 teaspoon mustard, 1 egg, 2 cups corn kernels, 1 tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce, Buttered crumbs.

Method: Make a sauce of butter, flour and milk. Add salt and mustard. Beat egg and combine with corn and Worcestershire. Add to cream sauce.

Four into greased baking dish, cover with buttered crumbs and bake 15 to 30 minutes in a moderate oven. If this does not seem "devilish" enough when mixed, add 1-2 teaspoon chili powder.

PINEAPPLE WHIP

One-half cup sugar, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1-2 cups pineapple juice, 3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca, 2 egg yolks, well beaten, 2 egg whites.

Combine sugar, salt, and pineapple juice and tapioca in saucepan. Bring mixture quickly to a full boil over direct heat. (Mixture will be thin. Do not overcook.) Add egg yolks, mixing thoroughly. Beat egg whites until stiff enough to hold shape. Fold hot tapioca mixture gradually into egg whites. Cool—mixture thickens as it cools. Serves 4 to 6.

CHOCOLATE MOUSSE

One and a half squares bitter chocolate, 1 cup evaporated milk, 20 marshmallows, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup heavy cream.

Method: Shave chocolate and combine with milk and marshmallows. Cook over boiling water until well blended. If any chocolate remains unmet, beat mixture with an egg beater. Chill and add vanilla. Whip cream and fold in chocolate mixture. Pour into freedzing tray and freeze for several hours.
