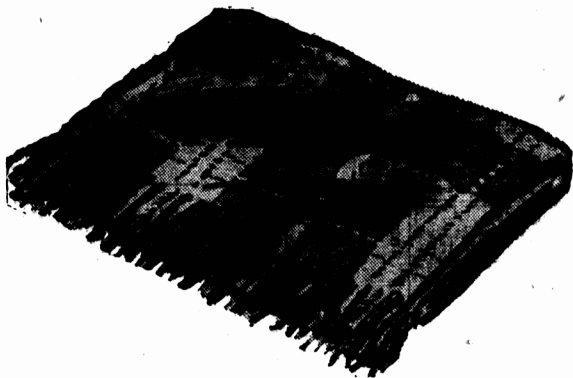

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### RETIRED NAVAL CRAFT BECOME MERCHANTMEN

AUCKLAND, N.Z., Oct. 4—(CP)—A New Zealand syndicate of ex-servicemen has bought a tank landing-craft and a gun landing-craft from the Royal Navy and will use them for trading on the New Zealand coast. The syndicate consists mainly of former naval officers.

It sent one of its members to Singapore to buy the craft. They have begun operations by loading urgently needed steel cargoes in Australia on their delivery voyage for transport to New Zealand.

The ships will carry 500 to 600 tons of freight. Because of their shallow draught they are very suitable for operating small harbors which offer difficulties to most ships. Several offers have already been made for their services.

The ships will be manned as far as possible by former naval crews.
