Islanders I Have Met

By "Islander Abroad"

Winnipeg, Man. — This morning I visited with Mrs. J.P. Keyes at 66 Harvard St., River Heights, Winnipeg, and spent a couple of hours in the balcony living room conversing about New Argyle and vicinity, and Charlottetown, P.E.I., whilst the interior decorators were busily engaged in doing their work on several rooms.

The Keyes home is a palatial residence in one of Winnipeg's wealthier sections and is a large and beautiful structure, richly and magnificently furnished.

Mrs. Keyes was the former Viola MacSwain, daughter of the late John and Ann (MacKay) MacSwain of New Argyle and Charlottetown P.E.I. Mr. MacSwain—known as Black John MacSwain to distinguish him from a cousin who was referred to as Big John MacSwain—came to P.E.I. with his parents from the Isle of Skye, Scotland when he was six years old. His mother was a MacLeod.

Mr. MacSwain, who married Ann MacKay of Crapaud, P.E.I., owned and operated a farm in New Argyle, P.E.I., and had as his next door neighbour the Murdoch MacLeod family, a first cousin who also were Isle of Skye emigrants—and was well known throughout many sections of the country in an old time business of horse trading. Whilst in New Argyle, Mr. MacSwain became paralyzed and the family—because the children were small—sold the farm and moved to Charlottetown where Mrs. MacSwain kept a boarding house. Mr. MacSwain was a paralytic cripple for twenty eight years.

Mrs. MacSwain came to Western Canada in 1909 and passed away in 1910. Her body was taken to P.E.I. and was interred beside that of her husband in Long Creek cemetery.

Mrs. Keyes trained at the P.E.I. Island Hospital when Miss Ross was the Superintendent of Nurses, and came west in 1910—a short time before her mother's death.

Mrs. Keyes has four sisters, Flora of Winnipeg, accountant at the Vulcan Iron Works, which position she has held for thirty-five years. Before coming west, Flora was cashier at the "Old London House", Charlottetown, which dealt on English lines, and later with "Sentner and MacLeod", Charlottetown; Belle, Mrs. Owen Gurney in Toronto, who at one time worked at the Guardian Office, Charlottetown; Mary, Mrs. Peter Taylor, formerly of California, now of Toronto; and Sade in New York. A sister, Caroline, passed away in Winnipeg some years ago.

Mr. Keyes is a native of St. Stephen, N.B., and is Vice-President of the Stanley Brook Ltd.—Commission brokers, Winnipeg.

The Keyes have two children, Marguerite, Mrs. MacArthur in Winnipeg; Nancy, Mrs. MacArthur in Toronto.

Mr. MacNair is employed with the D.V.A. in Winnipeg; Mr. MacArthur is a salesman in Toronto; and Mrs. MacArthur is an instructor in figure skating with the Granite Club in Toronto.

At 280 Eugene St., Newwood, Winnipeg, I visited with Mr. and Mrs. William Villet and Mr. and Mrs. Harold Farrow at the Villet home.

Mr. Villet, who is the son of the late George and Catherine (Ferguson) Villet, and who was born in Hampton, P.E.I. came west in 1906, and carved a way in comfortable living for himself and his family.

Mrs. Villet has three brothers, Warren of Hampton, P.E.I.; Edgar of Sacramento, California; and Rev. Harrison, Principal of the Alberta College in Edmonton. (Rev. Harrison Villet obtained his D.D. degree in January); and three sisters, Mrs. Thomas Storey of Crapaud; Mrs. Fay Cook of Winnipeg; and Mrs. Alex Mayne of Toronto.

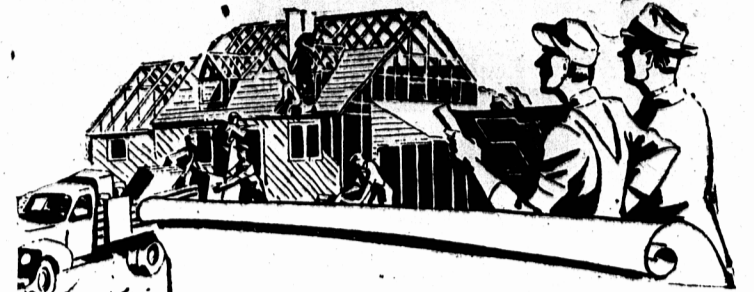
Mr. Villet is salesman for D. Ackland (Fort Street Auto-Motive branch) in Winnipeg.

Mrs. Villet was the former Pearl Curtis of Victoria, P.E.I., and was well known in the surrounding districts as the local dressmaker.

Mr. Harold Farrow, who is the son of the late Capt. James Farrow and Mae (Howatt) Farrow and who was born in Tryon, P.E.I., lived as a lad for a time in Sask. later in the Eastern States, and afterwards returning to P.E.I., attended school in Tryon. Mr. Farrow was in World War I enlisting in Boston, Mass. at the Canadian Recruiting Office, and was with the 42nd Highlanders, Montreal Black Watch, and saw action from the battle of Arras to the end of the conflict.

In 1920, Mr. Farrow came west to live, and is Deputy Inspector of Aircraft Engine Overhaul, C.P.R. He invented a skate grinder, patented in 1934; and is past chairman of the Manitoba Chapter of the American Society for Metals.
