GUY ANN LOWERS MARITIME TRACK RECORD

Sets New Mark Of 2.24 For Two-year-olds

Five Classes Of Colt Futurities Keenly Contested. Great Interest Displayed By Spectators.

An almost perfect day and afternoon was reserved by the weather for the staging of the second annual Colt Futurity races of the Prince Edward Island Racing Club.

RECORD LOWERED

The highlight of the afternoon was the lowering of the Maritime race record for two year olds from 2.24 1-4 to 2.24 by Guy Ann, dainty little miss owned by George A. Callbeck.

The fact that the fifteen heats could be run off from starting time 1.50 p. m. to 5.46 p. m. shows that when horsemen co-operate with the officials a lot can be accomplished.

The promoters of the Prince Edward Island Harness Racing Club must have felt very proud indeed at the success which attended the holding of these Futurities. The idea of having colt races was first mooted in the early spring of 1934 and an Association was formed in Summerside with representatives present from all over the province.

Yesterday the two year old pace was won in 2.24 and the three year old pace in 2.21 1-2, new records for the pacers in each event. The two year old trotters failed, however, to equal the time made by Gordon Dawson's Bud Aubrey last year.

Added Class
An added class was the four year old futurity which drew an entry of five and was won by Paddy Aubrey, owned by Harry O'Brien.

Other winning drivers were Geo. Callbeck, previously mentioned, Willard Kelly, winner of the three year old pace with his own record of 2.21 1-2, and Harry O'Brien, who won the four year old class with his Paddy Aubrey, Paddy lowering his mark from 2.22 to 2.17.

By the way, many remarked that the races reminded them very much of former exhibition days. Had the Exhibition been held this year in the fall as it was until 1928, this would have been the week selected and the management would have considered themselves fortunate indeed in having such a splendid day for it.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Sept. 25—It's possible Jack Sharkey, former heavyweight champion from Boston, may come out of retirement to take a shot at the new sensation of the ring, Joe Louis.

"I'd like to make that match," said Mike Jacobs, promoter who has Louis under exclusive contract, today. "Sharkey's manager, Johnny Buckley, was in yesterday but I was too busy with details of the Louis-Baer fight to talk much to him. It would draw a tremendous gate, and I'd like to put it on, maybe in the spring either here or in Boston. I understand Sharkey right now is within a couple pounds of fighting weight."

Sharkey retired after losing the heavyweight title to Primo Carnera on a knockout, and dropping decisions to King Levinsky and Tommy Loughran in 1933.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25—Cleveland Indians won their final game of the season with Detroit Tigers today 3-2 after collecting 10 hits off the hurriers of the championship team.

Hal Trosky of Cleveland made three hits batting right handed against Elton Hogsett, Detroit southpaw. Trosky's single scored Joe Vosmik with the winning run in the seventh inning.

Lloyd Brown, Cleveland pitcher, held Detroit to six hits. Early season sensations of the American League, the White Sox, saw themselves officially buried in the second division for the 15th consecutive year at Chicago.

St. Louis Browns edged them out 4-3 to sweep the three-game series here and put the Chicagoans 41-2 games back of fourth place with only four to play.

Ray Phelps pitched five-hit ball for the Sox, while the Chicagoans got 10 blows off Sugar Cain, but a lightning inner defence gave Cain the edge.

Second Inning Home Run By Cavarretta Gives Cubs 1-0 Victory Over Cards

(By Paul Mickelson Associated Press Sports Writer) ST. LOUIS, Sept. 25—The gas house gang of St. Louis was gasped today.

Withering fumes from the unerring smokeball of Lonnie Warneke, and one terrific exclamation off the bat of 19-year-old Phil Cavarretta left the world's champion Cardinals hanging all but lifeless on the ropes as the rambling Chicago Cubs blanked them 1-0, for their 19th straight victory, a brilliant conquest that put them within one triumph of the National League pennant.

The victory, scored in one of the most superb duels since Abner Hack, 3b, virtually clinched the flag for the sensational men of Grimm.
