FEDERAL REPORT SHOWS

WASHINGTON, D. C., November 4.—Pennsylvania's coal business one of the state's prime industries—experienced a 23,500,000-ton shrinkage last year. Final reports to the Bureau of Mines showed the 1930 production of both bituminous and anthracite as 193,47,624 tons. The 1929 tonnage was 217,344,436. The decline in production was accompanied by a drop in the value of the product at the mine or from \$644,250,000 to \$568,158,000.

Of general scope, the decline occurred in both branches of the industry, the bituminous output dropping from 143,316,241 to 124,462,787 and anthracite from 73,928,195 to 69,384,837. Average value per ton at the mine dropped eight cents from \$1.80 for bituminous and eleven cents from \$5.22 for anthracite.

Despite the reduced output, both bituminous and hard coal mines employed more men underground last year than 1929. The figures are: 89,452 for soft coal last year as against 87,705 in 1929 and 78,770 for hard coal compared to 77,395 in 1929.

Emigration from the Irish Free State has experienced a remarkable slump this year, according to figures just announced. The total in the first seven months was 825, as compared with 27,148 in 1927. This year's emigrants to the United States numbered 513, to Canada 106, to Australia, 77, and to other countries 129.
