WALL CLEANER

LEMON BREAD Pudding

1 cup bread crumbs.
2 cups milk
1-2 cup sugar
Grated rind 1-2 lemon.
2 egg yolks
4 tablespoons sugar
1 tablespoon lemon juice
Method: Use 2 day old bread to make the crumbs. Cover these with the milk and allow to stand for 1 hour. Add the grated lemon rind along with the sugar, then mix in the beaten egg yolks. Pour into a greased baking dish and bake in a fairly slow oven (325 deg. F.) for about 35 minutes, or until set. Put in a cool place, to chill thoroughly.

Cover with a meringue made by heating the 2 egg whites with the 4 tablespoons sugar and adding the lemon juice. Brooder the meringue by placing in a moderate oven (325 deg. F.) for about 15 minutes. Chill again before serving. The flavor is better if this is served cold.

Corned Beef and Cabbage

Jiggs' favourite meal is tops from a nutritional point of view

To Cook Corned Beef and Cabbage

Ask your butcher for a suitable piece from the brisket, rump or plate. Cover with boiling water and simmer (do not boil) until tender—for a 3 lb. piece allow 3 1/2 hours. Add cabbage cut in sections 20 minutes before cooking is complete. Serve dumplings as extender. Cook enough to serve once hot, once cold and once as sizzling, savoury corned beef hash.

Corn your own Beef

If your butcher doesn't have corned beef, you may like to pickle a piece from the round, or brisket yourself. Here is an easy way.

The Pickle

2 quarts cold water
1/2 lb. salt
1/2 cup (packed) brown sugar
1/4 oz. salt peter

Boil together for ten minutes, skimming frequently. Strain into an earthenware crock. As soon as the pickle is cold, put in your meat and leave it for 10 days. If the pickle does not cover the meat, turn it once a day.
