Good returns have been received from Souris where the canvas was made by the four teachers of the High School under the direction of the principal, Mr. Russell Leard.

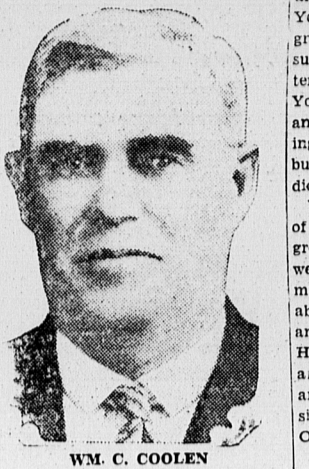

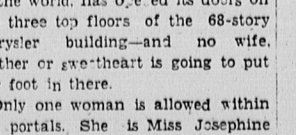

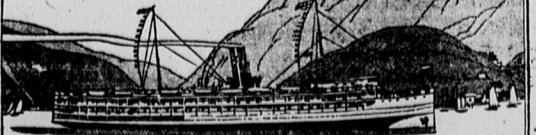
