

—**P. E. I. LIGHT HORSE AT SUMMERSIDE**—On Saturday morning at 10 o'clock the Prince Edward Island Light Horse arrived in Summerside and were welcomed by the Mayor and a number of citizens. They paraded through the town and then pitched their tents at the Exhibition Grounds where they will camp until Thursday. There are three squadrons, A, B, and C. On Saturday afternoon they paraded by the Grand Stand at the Driving Park and put on a fine exhibition of horseback wrestling. On Wednesday they are putting on a sport programme in the park. Sunday morning they paraded to the Presbyterian Church to take part in divine worship. Their Chaplain, Capt. R. Moorhead Legate, D. D., was present and took part in the service. Rev. C. J. St. Clair, pastor, conducted the service and preached a very inspiring and patriotic sermon. Mr. George Downess sang with fine effect Rudyard Kipling's Recessional. The National Anthem was sung at the close of the service. S.

—**SUMMERSIDE POLICE COURT**—There were thirteen arrests over the weekend in Summerside, eleven for drunkenness and two for driving to the common danger. Stipendiary Magistrate E. H. Strong, K. C., meted out fines accordingly to all but one man, who was given fifteen days in jail for driving a car while under the influence of liquor. Bail of \$25 was forfeited by one man, arrested for driving to the common danger, who failed to appear in court. Three drunks forfeited bail of \$10 each and two five dollars bail. Three were fined \$3 and costs each; two paid and the other went to jail for ten days. One was fined \$2 and costs or ten days; he took the days. A party of young boys of ten age, thirteen in all had boarded a motor speed-boat to cross from Port Hill to Lennox Island. When about half a mile from shore they tried to turn while going at full speed, and the boat capsized, throwing the occupants into the water. Mr. Sark, who runs the ferry at this point, saw their difficulty and rushed to the scene. Some of the boys tried to swim to the shore and were picked up, while others clung to the overturned motor boat. Sark did not leave the scene until every boy was safe on shore. Only one young
