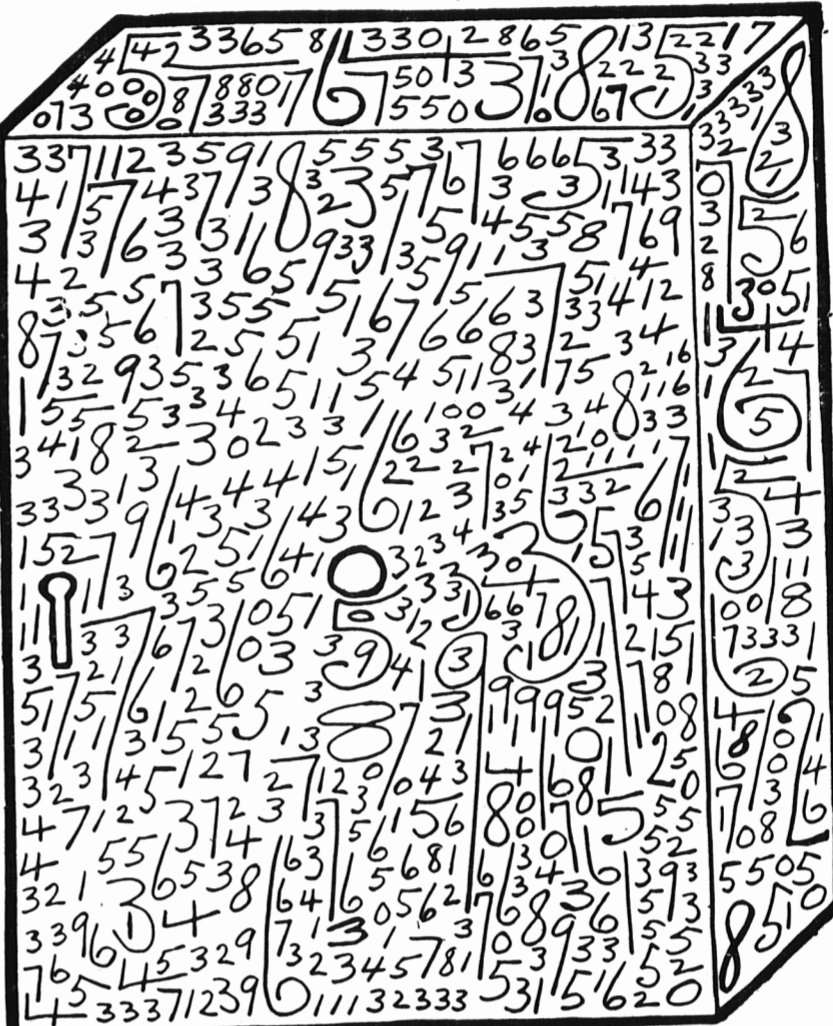

mediate family living in the same house. MONTREAL, July 24 (CP)—Demand for high-grade eggs and cheese fell off sharply on open produce markets last week, egg prices dropping one to four cents, and cheese about a half cent. Butter prices held fairly steady. Cheamery butter prints to retail dealers sold for 26 to 27 cents a pound and sales for 25 1-2 to 26 1-2 cents. Western butter delivered here was 25 1-2 cents asked, and Quebec pasteurized whole wholesale jobbing price was 25 cents. Cheese sold at 14 1-8-1-4 cents a pound wholesale for No. 1 Ontario colored, 13 3-4 for Quebec white and 13 7-8 for Quebec colored. Graded egg shipments in carlots or less sold for 27 to 27 1-2 cents a dozen for A-large, 25 to 26 for A-medium, 24 to 24 1-2 for B and 22 for C. Potatoes—Que.
