

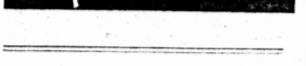

ROSE-SPRAYING FOR PESTS AND DISEASES

A careful eye must be kept on roses now if they are to be grown clean and healthy. A constant watch must be kept for insect pests and diseases, such as mildew. Caterpillars often attack the rose at this time, and should you see any leaves eaten, get them sprayed with an insecticide without delay. Greenfly is an old enemy and will often put in an appearance early, but if the bushes are well sprayed with an insecticide, using it to direction, and making sure that the bushes are wet, they are easily destroyed.

LEAF-ROLLER

The leaf-rolling fly often attacks the rose bush at this time, and spraying is not effective. The only way is to hand pick, as the worm curls the leaf tightly round itself, and the spray cannot get at it. Those who intend to exhibit should thin the shoots when they are about two to three inches long if the roses have been pruned properly the top shoot will be growing outwards from the centre of the bush, but if the plant is vigorous there will be many shoots growing into the centre.

THE GARDENIA

The gardenias are a family of plants related to the madders, found chiefly in tropical countries. From some gardenias an excellent dye is obtained from others a yellow resin, and others are valuable for the timber they produce. They were named by Linnaeus after Alexander Garden, a Scotch botanist.

BELLS OF ABERDOVEY

Do you know the old legend of the Bells of Aberdovey? They are said to have rung the morning prayer in the monastery of a town long lost under the waves, and even now tradition says the bells swing to and fro with the tides of Cardigan Bay, the melancholy tolling resounding far out at sea.

FEEDING

Feeding with liquid manure should begin whenever the bud shows, but never give a soaking of liquid if the ground is dry; rather give the soil a good soaking with clean water beforehand. This also applies to feeding with artificial manures. Give a good watering before and water the artificial manure in. A dressing of sulphate of potash at the rate of two oz. per square yard will be very beneficial for making good strong foliage.

TULIP-LIFTING

Tulips that are lifted from beds should have the seed pods removed and be transplanted into some other part of the garden to ripen. When the foliage dies down lift and dry, and these bulbs will do for another year. If the border is not available a box filled with soil and the tulips put into this, giving them a watering occasionally, will do as well. All bedding plants should be hardened off in readiness for planting by the first or second week in June.

SOIL

Before planting summer flowering plants the soil should have good well-rotted manure dug in. This will help to hold the moisture in dry weather.

Put on top of each dish of rennet-custard and garnish with whole strawberries.
