

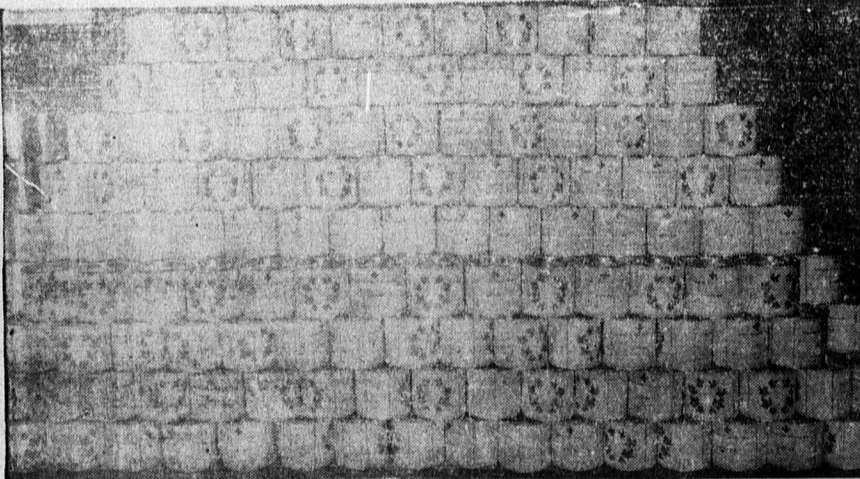

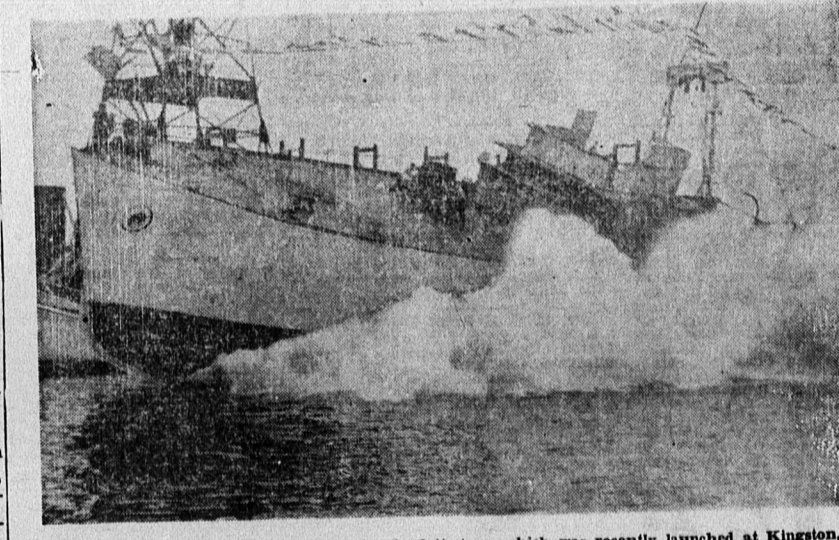
H. M. C. S. Charlottetown
