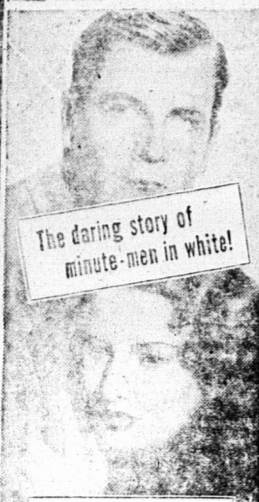

"Internes Can't Take Money" At Prince Edward

Internes Can't Take Money, a highly romantic drama, came to the Prince Edward Theatre last night with that splendid pair of screen lovers, Barbara Stanwyck and Joel McCrea in the leading roles.

Both enact their parts, she as an unemployed girl with a past, and he as a young interne with the charm that has made of them the favorite romantic film pair of millions. Lloyd Nolan is also in the cast in a splendid role.

Internes Can't Take Money is a powerful story of a dilemma which arises when McCrea finds it impossible to take a fee from a patient which would make it possible for him to wed Miss Stanwyck and to bring her happiness by re-uniting her with her child by a previous marriage.

The film is noteworthy for the accuracy with which it portrays hospital life. This was made possible through the services of Dr. John J. Toma, onetime athlete and at present chief resident physician of the Hollywood Hospital, who acted as technical advisor to Director Alfred Santel and whose efforts much of the behind-the-scenes action is candidly portrayed with life and vigor.

"Torchy Blane" At Capitol

That clever young girl reporter Torchy Blane—depicted by the gay and laugh-provoking Glenda Farrell—will be seen again today on the screen of the Capitol in Torchy Blane, The Adventurous Blonde, a comedy-drama.

Likewise will be seen her likeable but not-so-brilliant boy friend, Detective-Lieutenant Steve McBride, portrayed by that big hunk of the films Barton MacLane.

Torchy Blane, the Adventurous Blonde is described as even funnier and more exciting than its two predecessors in the series, Smart Blonde and Flivaway Baby, in which the same pair of players were the principals.

It is a tale about how a quartet of male reporters, irked by Torchy's scoring of so many scoops over them, try to get vengeance.

They hire an out-of-work actor to play the part of a corpse and give Torchy a lot of misinformation about a supposed murder. She hustles to her paper and writes a big story about the crime, and the framers, chuckle when Torchy's appears on the street.

But the gag boomerangs on the boys, because the fake murder turns out to be an actual murder, which Torchy and Steve solve, and the conspirators are the ones that prove out of luck.

ATTLEE FACES CENSURE VOTE

Ridicules Report Loyalties Beaten On Return To London.

LONDON, Dec. 13—(CP) Haves—Facing a motion of censure in the House of Commons for statements made in Madrid, Clement Attlee, Labor Opposition Leader, returned to London today from Spain to declare that "any idea the Spanish Government is beaten is entirely false."

Mr. Attlee described as "ridiculous" the attempt to obtain a vote in the Commons censuring him for public statements in support of the Government cause made during his Spanish tour at the head of a labor delegation.

Interviewed in the Commons corridors this afternoon, the Opposition Leader was optimistic regarding Spanish Republican chances. He expressed the conviction that any Insurgent efforts to take Madrid are doomed to failure.

"I was surprised at the organization, both civil and military," he continued. "The general impression given us in many places was such that we could not have known a war was going on."

The Labor leader was particularly moved by the welcome he and the delegation received. When they arrived at a theatre one night the actors stopped the show while the orchestra played "God Save The King." Mr. Attlee and his companions, including Philip Noel Baker and Miss Ellen Wilkinson, replied by extending their clenched fists in the Popular Front salute.

King George To Broadcast Christmas Day

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Dec. 12—Canadian wild life today flickered across a screen at Buckingham Palace as the Royal Family spent a normal, quiet day on the anniversary of the historic announcement in the House of Commons that King Edward VIII had executed an instrument of abdication.

King George, following the custom of his beloved father, will speak to the Empire on Christmas afternoon, it was announced. The message will be broadcast from Sandringham House, his father's favorite residence.

The last Christmas message was in 1935, less than a month before George V died. There was none last year in the aftermath of the abdication.

Today's move was given by "Grey Owl," the Canadian Indian naturalist, in a "command performance" of his film dealing with the life of the beaver on the Mississippi River.

The movie was shown especially for the young Princesses, Elizabeth and Margaret Rose, but was also enjoyed by the King and Queen Elizabeth.

Ontario And Quebec To Establish An Economic Alliance

TORONTO, Dec. 10—Governments of Ontario and Quebec seek to join forces in placing their views on Dominion-Provincial relations before the Rowell Commission, now in Western Canada studying that relationship. Plans for an inter-provincial conference to that end were announced today by Premiers Hepburn and Duplessis.

At Queen's Park Mr. Hepburn said arrangements would be completed late today for such a conference. Later he was in telephone conversation with the Quebec Premier, who announced he would meet the Ontario Government leader in Montreal Monday. The Quebec Premier however would not discuss the conference's subject.

"We are going to form an economic alliance with Quebec," Mr. Hepburn said. "The demands from the western provinces seem to indicate that Ontario and Quebec will have to stand together on representations to the Commission."
