OLD AGE PENSIONS

Q. To what extent are old age pensions granted in Canada?

A. Canada passed The Old-Age Pensions Act in 1927, providing for a Dominion-Provincial pension system "to be effective" in such provinces as has enacted special legislation for this purpose. This Federal Act is operative in British Columbia, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. Other provinces, as well as the North West Territories are considering similar action. The act provides for a pension to any British Subject 70 or over, with an income not exceeding \$365; the maximum amount to be \$240 per annum.
