NEW YORK'S FUR MARKET REPORT

We are pleased to report that the Fur Market in general shows unusual activity for this season of the year. This is mainly due to the unexpectedly large spring business done by manufacturers not only in spring and summer furs but to a great extent in winter-goods purchased for immediate and fall delivery. Fear of still higher prices has no doubt influenced this increased early buying.

The embargo which became effective on May 13th last makes it impossible to import foreign goods for the time being. As a result, available stocks of Russian, Japanese, Chinese and Australian goods are meeting with a lively demand and will probably be exhausted before the end of the season. This lack of foreign goods, it is anticipated, may drive the market still higher on some American articles.

Since our spring sale the market has continued steady, with a brisk demand for muskrat, marten, racoon, wolf, skunk, good colored mink, opossum and practically all kinds of fox. The quantities of these articles in the hands of dealers are now below normal. There is also a good demand for lynx, otter, beaver, ermine and fisher, while beaver, badger, wild cat, civet cat and gray fox have moved a bit slowly in comparison.

The date of our next sale will be September 23rd and goods will be received up to September 3rd, 1918.

We have set the date for our fall sale somewhat earlier than usual feeling that all articles will then be in better demand and will realize correspondingly higher prices, as buyers will have the opportunity of dressing and drying their goods in ample time to meet the demands of the fall and winter trade.

Our market reports will be issued from time to time and during the interval our Market Service Bureau is prepared to send you, upon request, accurate information as to prevailing market conditions regarding any articles in which you may be especially interested.

Liberal advances will be made whenever desired immediately upon receipt of merchandise.
