250 BRITISH SHIPS EQUIPPED WITH COOLD STORAGE CAPACITY

LONDON, June 3.—(Reuters)—At a dinner of the old storage association Sir Joseph Brodribb, presiding, said that there were now 250 British ships with refrigerating accommodation of 50,000,000 cubic feet, a noteworthy number and a capacity greater than ever despite the U-boats.

Right Hon. G. Roberts, food controller, referring to the value of refrigeration, mentioned that since the beginning of 1918 there had never been less than 82,000,000 tons of produce stored in the United Kingdom, over half of which was meat. The war had revealed the fact that the greatest of Great Britain's weaknesses had been the dependence on outside sources of supply.

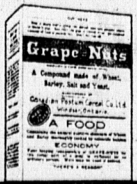
