SEVERELY WOUNDED—Alexander D. MacLeod of Alliston King's Co., has received a letter from his son, L. Cpl. Charles MacLeod 712809 13th Canadian Highlanders, saying that he had been wounded on August 8th in the left heel, left knee, and right chest. The letter was dated Aug. 15, and he was then in the 1st Australian General Hospital, Rouen, and was doing well. L. Corpl. MacLeod, who crossed to England with the 105th, was drafted into the 13th Battalion and went to France in November 1916.

FROM THE MAGDALENES—Mr. William Sumarah, merchant of the Magdalen Islands, left on return last evening after a short visit to Charlottetown. He reports that the people of the Magdalenes are enjoying prosperity as a result of the good catches of cod and mackerel being taken. The late lobster season was also very successful. The steamer Enterprise which is now maintaining communication between the Islands, Souris and Pictou, is considered not nearly adequate for the service, not being able to handle anything like the freight offering.

Cameron, formerly the champion long distance runner of Canada, and winner of the famous Boston Marathon, is spending a few days in Amherst, prior to his departure to Halifax, where he will enlist in the Royal Flying Corps. While in the Windy City, the stocky Blue nose continued his running, and was regarded as one of the best men in the United States.

HUN AIR RESERVES GET BADLY THINNED

LONDON, Sept. 10.—The storm center of British aerial activity throughout the week has been the sector from Lens to Peronne, the airmen materially assisting in piercing the immensely strong Hindenburg defenses and harassing the retreating enemy. German organizations behind the Wotan line, including the vital railroads radiating from Valenciennes, were heavily bombed. In the course of the week 166 tons of explosives were dropped in the battle area. Ninety-two enemy machines were destroyed and four were reported as missing.

Hun Reserves Depleted. There are indications that the aerial reserves of the enemy are seriously depleted. A captured document lays stress on the necessity of saving to the uttermost all bits of air-planes which have crashed behind the German lines. The document says: "In view of the situation as regards raw material, our airplane industry is more and more reduced to relying on the working up of instruments and motors saved from destroyed air-planes. The supply of material for the front has become essentially dependent upon the return of waste material from the front."

More Than Can Handle. Commenting on the above, the military expert says "By withdrawing much-needed machines from wide sectors of her front Germany is still able to effect considerable strength, but to defend adequately her longer front on the Rhine and in Belgium and at the same time maintain battle squadrons in effective strength probably is now definitely beyond her power."

SIGHTED WRECKAGE OFF SABLE ISLAND

An Atlantic Port, Sept. 11.—The captain of a fishing vessel which arrived here today reported that on Sept. 5, twenty miles north of Sable Island, he passed more than fifty big bales
