FUR TRADE NEWS.—Mr. Chester McLure manager of the P. E. I. Fur Sales, Board left Saturday afternoon for Alberton, where he will buy consignments. He will purchase one special lot of high grade skins, one hundred in number, the product of one ranch. Mr. McLure states that according to a market report received Saturday morning from the International Furriers of America that skins, such as clear furred blacks and silvers are in good demand and will be absorbed at good prices. The poorer grades and off-colored have declined in price. Ranchers therefore with clear high-grade pelts can expect a good average price.

PRISONER RELEASED.—Mrs. Mary Macdonald, of Riverton has received a cable from England stating that her son Pte. Daniel Macdonald, Infantry, previously reported 'missing' on October 10th is now officially reported a released prisoner of war. He arrived at Hull England, Dec. 11th. Pte. Macdonald enlisted in Boston with the McLean Highlanders on July 17th, 1917, and crossed to England in March 1918. He saw some hard fighting but went through it without a scratch. Mrs. Macdonald with her family is living at her old home in Riverton. She has three daughters living in the United States. Two other sons endeavored to enlist but were turned down under age.
