Prices Ease Up On Montreal Stock Market

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Sept. 23—Prices on the Montreal Stock Exchange tended a little easier after displaying a steady trend in the first hour of trading in Saturday's abbreviated session.

Bank stocks were much quieter after their active and buoyant performance Friday. Bank of Commerce, the only one to be traced in board lots, lost two points at 158 in contrast to its six point advance of the previous session.

Minor Gains In Stocks On New York Exchange

(By Frederick Gardner) (Associated Press Financial Writer) (A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Sept. 23—While financial markets seemed to be animated by greater hope, the pace of recovery in stocks slowed down almost to a standstill at the weekend Saturday.

Share trading ebbed as the rally tapered off, but rather active buying of corporate bonds moved prices forward in the investment list for the fourth consecutive session.

Financial Experts In Conference

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Sept. 23—More than 100 financial experts and industrial leaders, after conferring in utmost secrecy, have completed a financial credo which attacks practically every detail of the monetary program of the Roosevelt administration, according to the Herald Tribune.

Meeting Sept. 12, 13 and 14 at the Lido Country Club on Long Island under the auspices of the American Management Association, the group heard addresses by bankers and industrialists, then decided, according to the Tribune:

Financial Experts In Conference

That the continuance of a heavily unbalanced federal budget, combined with the inconvertibility of United States money is probably the major factor in increasing business uncertainty; that the country can neither spend nor tax its way back to prosperity, and that a continued debasement of the dollar will threaten a collapse in business worse than anything the country has ever known.

To avert this disaster the conference urged the President to give assurance there will be no further debasement of the monetary standard; that it will be the intention to stabilize the dollar as near to the old par as practicable; that paper and silver money be again made convertible into gold, with all restrictions on the private holding of gold removed; that all silver legislation passed by the recent Congress shall be repealed at the next session, and that the so-called "inflation" or "Thomas" act which gave the President such broad discretionary powers in money matters shall also be repealed.
