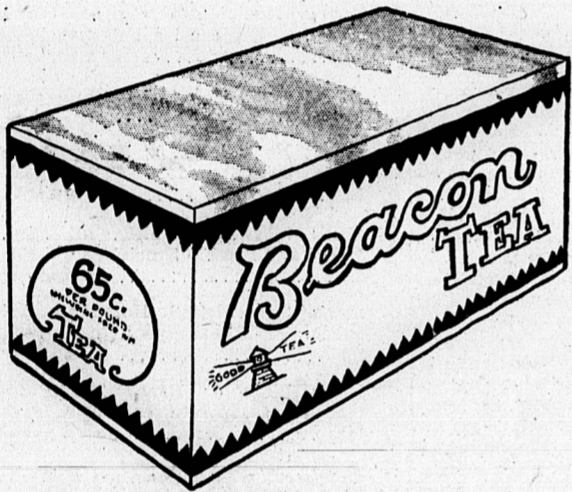

LIVESTOCK MARKET MONTREAL, Que., May 20.—There were seven cattle, 336 calves, 1916 hogs and 31 sheep and lambs for

sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today. The cattle market was unchanged.

Calves were mostly common to just plain quality and were sold for \$3.50 to \$4.50. Fair to just medium quality calves brought from \$5 to \$5.25.

Sheep were sold for \$4.50 to \$5 and spring lambs brought from \$11 to common light lambs to \$14 per cwt. for good lambs weighing 50 pound, or better.

Hogs were steady at \$5.75 with a odd sale a shade higher. Sows brought \$4 to \$4.75.
