BILLIARD AND POOL ROOM OPEN TONIGHT

Mr. Lambros proposes fitting up the lower floor as a tobacco store, a shoe shine and a shoe repairing shop the equipment and machinery for which will be installed shortly. This evening the Billiard Room upstairs will be opened. Three new pool tables and an English billiard table have been installed, the best of their kind and certainly the best of their kind ever seen in Charlottetown. The appointment rests with the Archbishop, who in this case has made a very happy and wise choice. Archdeacon Vroom went to King's in 1888, after spending eight years in New Brunswick. In 1895 Bishop Courtney appointed him a canon.

CAPT. MCKEE COMING HOME.—The Fredericton Gleaner says: Capt. W. A. McKee, who went overseas with the First Division, and after coming home was in command of the 65th Battery of Artillery, at Woodstock, and later of the Tank Battalion, has written to friends that he is in excellent health and expects to return soon to Canada. He is at present at Rhyll, in the north of Wales, but expects to leave for home in a few weeks. Capt. McKee was for some time organist of the Brunswick St. Baptist church in this city.

HANDED OVER KEYS.—At Monday evening's meeting of the City Council, Mayor Wright announced that the Army and Navy Veterans' Association had handed over the key of the room formerly occupied by them in the Market Building. He said that the Premier had asked the Council if they would give the room formerly used as a Recruiting Room, for the use of the Labour Bureau about to be established here for returned soldiers. The request was referred to Councilor Smith, Chairman of the Market Committee who said he would look into the matter. The room would require some repairs and alterations before it could be used for the purpose intended.
