THE OPEN DOOR POLICY.

Much has been said and written, respecting the "open door" policy of Great Britain in the east and the noble diplomatic battle she has been fighting to retain for herself and all other nations an equal chance to have a share in the large trade of China.

But the purposes of the Republic in the matter of the open door must shortly be tested in a very practical way. The United States is acquiring new possessions in the West Indies and also in the far east.

EDITORIAL NOTES

It is thought that the defeat of the government of Cape Colony in the newly elected assembly by a majority of two votes may mean the restoration of Cecil Rhodes to another term of power.

Hon. Mr. Gibson, Commissioner of Crown Lands in Ontario, who was defeated in the general election and has not yet secured a seat, has now been nominated to run at the by-election in East Wellington.

Bad news comes from Manitoba to the effect that continued wet weather has destroyed one quarter of the magnificent wheat crop. According to a telegraphic report, the loss will be many millions of bushels.

The Soleil claims that the majority against prohibition in Quebec will total over 91,000, thus swamping the vote in favor in the other provinces, with 20,000 over. To this the Montreal Witness remarks:—"We are not prepared to say that the returns from the French parishes do not show a negative majority of ninety or a hundred thousand. We see nothing to hinder its being made much greater according to the methods used in some quarters."

The remarkable story of Louis de Rougement, the so-called "modern Crusoe," whose exploits and endurance even excel those of his prototype, is just now exciting much attention in England. Some of the newspapers accept his tale as genuine while other journals are skeptical.

The German Emperor has had various plans for obtaining possessions in South America and South Africa which have failed. He is now thought to have turned his august attention to Asia Minor, and his visit to Jerusalem is believed to be in furtherance of a plan to obtain a footing in that quarter.

Birmingham has been compelled to seek an additional source of water supply and can only find it seventy-three miles away in the mountains of Wales. There a tract of 45,669 acres has been purchased near the source of two streams and these have been connected by a tunnel over a mile long.

The relative claims of Sampson and Schley to the glory of the victory by which the Spanish fleets were destroyed at Santiago have been decided upon by the Naval Board at Washington. The substance of their reports is that it was a captain's fight; that it was fought under the orders previously given by Sampson; that the two orders given by Schley to "close in," and to "engage the enemy" did no good and were unnecessary for this was being done when the orders were signalled; and that each captain fought his ship on plans prepared and others given by Sampson.

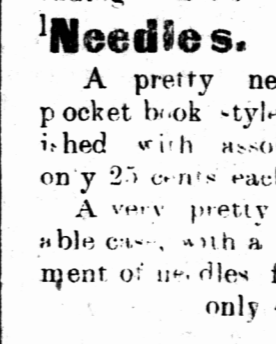

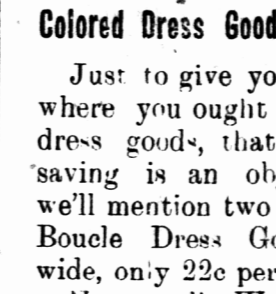

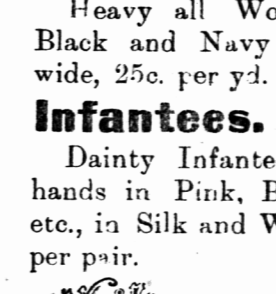
