Death Of Mr. Hugh Duffy, Kinkora

Hugh Duffy died at his home in Kinkora on Tuesday, the second day of April instant at the advanced age of 87 years and was engaged in the mill business with his brother.

He was the youngest and last surviving son of the late Patrick Duffy, one of the original immigrants who settled in Kinkora. He was born on his father's homestead farm in Kinkora and spent his early years in the milling business with his brother.

At Duffy's Mills and with David Rogers, who then operated the mill where the Scales Electric Light Plant is now situated. Later he went to Winnipeg, Manitoba, where he worked for several years on the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway. He returned to this Province and settled down on the farm near Kinkora Church, where he died. His wife, Lavenia Smith, predeceased him several years ago.

His three sons, James, St. Clair and Earl went overseas during the Great War and were engaged in the tank battalion when the Armistice was proclaimed. James settled down in Cranbrook, British Columbia, where he still resides; St. Clair completed his medical studies and is now practising his profession successfully in Montreal. Earl returned back and took charge of his father's farm and is now one of the big potato growers and stock raisers of Kinkora. Another daughter, Beatrice is the wife of Eugene McIver, of Kinkora. Cecil and Louise reside on the homestead with Earl.

The late Hugh Duffy was one of the outstanding Conservatives of Kinkora and was well known for years as chairman of every political meeting held there. He had a great memory and a witty tongue and few men knew the political history of this country better than he did.

His funeral takes place to St. Malachi's Church, Kinkora, on Thursday, the 4th inst. at 9:30 a. m.

LEGISLATURE IN COMMITTEE YESTERDAY

Legislative Chamber, April 2.

The House met at 11:15 a. m. Mr. Wignmore presented a petition from William P. Hickey and others for an Act to incorporate the Christian Church at Bradshaw. A bill in accordance with the petition was received and read a first time.

Premier MacMillan introduced: "An Act to provide for certain Public Works"; "An Act respecting the sale of poisonous and dangerous drugs"; "An Act to amend the Statute Law" which were given first reading.

Mr. LePage on a question of privilege quoted The Guardian of April 1 as stating that Hon. Mr. Sharp had dealt trenchantly with the suggestion of Mr. B. W. LePage that the Government should have pledged the taxpayers money to cover up the Association's indebtedness; and also the Guardian, April 2, quoting Hon. Mr. Arsenault as stating Mr. LePage had said the Government might have gone to the Bank, secretly, and pledged the credit of this Province to answer for the debt of the Potato Growers' Association.

Both these statements Mr. LePage repudiated, saying he had never made them and that they were "absolutely false."

Mr. J. A. MacDonald: "What was your statement?"

Mr. LePage: "I will state my statement as soon as I have an opportunity, when the agricultural bill is before the House."

The following bill was read a third time and passed: An Act to Amend an Act to Incorporate the Charlottetown Summer Resorts Limited. (Mr. Bethune.)

On motion of Mr. Stewart the House went into committee with Mr. Wignmore in the chair on an Act authorizing the issue of debentures by the City of Charlottetown. The bill, which authorizes a debenture issue of \$81,500 for unemployment relief, permanent works and other street equipment, was agreed to.

On motion of Mr. Allan the House resumed committee reading with Mr. LePage in the chair on an Act to amend the Summerside Incorporation Act, 1923.

The bill, as amended provides that in a Stipendiary Magistrate's judgment when the amount of penalty exceeds \$10.00 the right of appeal to the County Court is given.

Hon. Mr. MacPhee suggested that the minimum amount could be omitted and right of appeal left open to every person.

After discussion by Mr. J. A. MacDonald, Hon. Mr. MacPhee, Mr. Allen, Mr. T. A. Campbell and others, progress was reported and leave asked to sit again.

On motion of Mr. T. A. Campbell the House resumed committee reading with Mr. LePage in the chair on an Act to amend an Act to Incorporate the West Prince Exhibition Association. The bill purposes to change the name to the Prince County Exhibition Association, and motion to it was agreed to.

Mr. J. A. MacDonald resumed the debate on the Budget.

Courage of Women On the Farm

"There is a good case for suggesting that every farmer and his family are entitled to a short holiday each year. In evidence given recently before the Royal Commission on Wheat Farming in Australia many farmers spoke of the courageous support which had been afforded to them in their fight with adversity by their wives and daughters, and the Commission feels that special reference should be made to the part which women are playing in maintaining the industry during the time of depression. On the average their work is harder than that of their sisters in the city, and the activities of various organizations in the different States of the Commonwealth should have wider support in order that the home life of the wheat farmer can be improved." The above extract from the report of the Royal Commission in Australia applies with equal force to the women on Canadian farms.

LIVESTOCK

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, April 2—Offerings on the two Montreal livestock markets today totalled 2,199 head. Receipts were composed of 78 cattle, 1,639 calves, 471 hogs and 11 sheep.

Medium quality cows brought \$3.25 to \$3.75 with common butcher cows around \$2.50 to \$3.00. Canners and cutters were from \$1.50 to \$2.00. One load of good Ontario steers was received late in the morning and not sold at time of writing.

Calves were just plain to medium quality. Prices ranged from \$3 to \$4.25—the bulk of the sale making between \$3.75 and \$4.

The few lambs offered brought \$6 per cwt. Sheep were around \$3.50. Light lambs are not wanted. On Monday's market, three lambs weighing together 175 lbs. sold for \$34 and two lambs, weighing together 70 lbs. sold at \$5 for the pair.

Flores were firm at \$8.50 for hogs, fed and watered, with \$1 per hog premium on select. Butchers, hogs and lights were \$8.30 and extra heavies \$7.85. Sows were from \$9.50 to \$7.25 with one choice up to \$7.50.
