Literature And Life

By BOOKMAN

EMERSON'S THRENODY

Emerson's "Threnody" is an elegy on his little boy who died at the age of five, and in literature it belongs to a distinguished family, for English literature is rich in elegies. We have Milton's "Lycidas" Tennyson's "In Memoriam"; Matthew Arnold's "Rugby Chapel" and "Thyrsis"; Shelley's "Adonais"; "Swinburne's Barry Cornwall"; It is interesting to run over the words he uses to tell how much he thought of his little boy. He calls him the "wondrous child," the "hyacinthine boy," the "gracious boy," the "eloquent child," the "child of Paradise." Another matter of interest is the fact that he owed something to writers of other days and who sounded the same notes that he did. We have echoes here of Milton. For instance, when he asks where were the angels who should have watched over the boy, we recall what Milton said: "Where were ye, Nymphs, when the remorseless deep Closed o'er the head of your loved Lycidas? Ah me! I fondly dream Had ye been there..."

Then look at this which Emerson asks: "Where were ye, Nymphs, when the remorseless deep Closed o'er the head of your loved Lycidas? Ah me! I fondly dream Had ye been there..."

Was there no star that could be sent No watcher in the firmament... Could stoop to heal that only child? Both writers appeal to heaven for a kindly interest in their trouble.

Then we think of Charles Lamb's poem on Hood's dead child: "She did but open an eye, and put A clear beam forth, then straight up shut For the long dark... who can show What thy short visit meant? Shall we say that Nature blind Checked her hand and changed her mind?"

Look now at Emerson: "Perchance not he but Nature failed The world and not the infant failed It was not ripe yet to sustain A genius of so fine a strain... Did he wait An aeon to be born?"

We think too of "In Memoriam," where Tennyson wonders if Hallam has forgotten him in the new lights of heaven. "Does my old friend remember me?" And Emerson is thinking of his little boy who death took away—"Hast thou forgot me in a new delight?" Shelley too must not be forgotten, for in "Adonais" he asks:

"Where wast thou, mighty Mother when he lay When thy son lay, pierced by the shaft that flies In darkness? Where was Iorn Urania Whelp Kdonais died?"

This too recalls Milton, and Emerson was doubtless influenced by both. The workings of Nature are noted too. After the boy died, the morning dawned with needless glow. Each fawn-bird chirped, each fowl must crow, but the most beautiful and sweet of human youth had left the hill and garden. There are feelings akin to this in other writers. Burns has it in "Ye banks and Braes of Bonnie Doon":

"How can ye chant, ye little birds And I so fu' o' care?..." "Thou'll break my heart, thou bonnie bird. That sings beside thy mate."

There seems an incongruity between Emerson's sorrow and a bright morning so with Burns. This Threnody touches to the quick all who have lost a child. At the end of the deep Heart assures that he and the child shall meet again, and that the boy had been lent him for a purpose. In fact was a teacher for the father. A wise Providence had sent him:

"Innocence that matched the sky, Lovely looks a form of wonder, Laughter rich as woodland thunders. And thoughtest thou such a guest Would in thy hall take up his rest?"

This child was to be a teacher and doubtless was—hence this

LIQUOR SALES STATEMENT

In a recent copy of "The Guardian" appeared the following item: "The legal sale of intoxicating liquor in the Province during the past seven months has declined four per cent compared to the sale for the corresponding seven months of last year. It was learned yesterday from the office of the Provincial Treasurer. No figures of the amount of sales for either period were released. The above statement is quite misleading and needs some explanation. In the preceding year, as all know, the Province did not have a Prohibitory law, but the notorious Cullen Amendment which had made Prince Edward Island a laughing stock all over sales reached an all-time high. Therefore to say that legal sales

are less than last year is very modest praise indeed, and certainly it does not say that they were less than under Prohibition.

At the recent meeting of the Temperance Federation the statement was made that the temperance forces had been defeated in the recent Plebiscite. They have not been defeated they have been cheated and tricked. The last two or three Plebiscites had given a mandate for prohibition, and the Government forced upon us the infamous Cullen Amendment. If the 1948 Plebiscite had gone in favour of Prohibition, what could we have expected from the present Government? Probably another Cullen Amendment, or something of the kind.

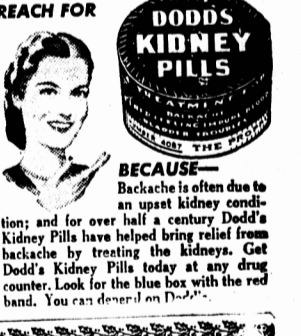
