WOUNDED IN LEG.—A telegram has been received by Mr. John McMillan, M. L. A., Fairview stating that his son Pte. Allison Eugene McMillan, Infantry was admitted to 46th Casualty Clearing Station, August 28th, with gun shot wound in the leg.

WOUNDED THIRD TIME.—Mr. James Kelly, Kent Street, has received a telegram notifying him that his son, Private A. E. Kelly ("Ted"), has been wounded by gunshot in action. He belongs to the 20th Battalion of Ontario and this is the third time he has been wounded. He is a brother of Lieut. J. G. Kelly, M. C., who was also wounded some time ago.

ANOTHER ISLANDER WOUNDED.—Mrs. Patrick Mahar yesterday received official intimation that her son, Private John Mahar was admitted to No 3 western general Hospital, Cardiff, gunshot wound left foot and knee. Pte. Mahar enlisted with the 105th and has been a year in France. His many friends will hope for his speedy recovery. He has another brother, Herbert in France.

WOUNDED IN FOOT.—Mr. John McLean, Teacher, Long Creek, has received word that his only son, Bruce McLean, has been reported admitted to the 26th General Hospital, Etaples, with a gunshot wound in the foot. Bruce, enlisted in 1915 with the 105th and was later transferred to the Fighting 26th before going to France. He is a nephew of Mr. James McLean, Customs and of Mrs. John M. Campbell, city.

A lady of unusual graciousness, the retiring teacher was an inspiration to her pupils and it was seldom necessary to exercise the disciplining measure to which teachers are so often forced to resort even with girls learning how to cook and keep house properly. Miss Bartlett's resignation removes another factor that has helped make St. John conspicuous in the public school life of the dominion and Superintendent Bridges must certainly regret the loss as keenly as any. WOUNDED.—Mrs. Havelock Bryant Enmore, has been notified that Pte. Stanley Bryant infantry, was officially reported admitted to 12 Stationary Hospital, St. Pol, August 27th gun shot wound in neck and face.

WOUNDED.—Mrs. Nicholas McFarlane, Charlottetown, has received a despatch stating that her son Private John MacFarlane was admitted to 54th General Hospital, Aubenque on August 30th with gunshot wound.

PTE. JERRY QUINN WOUNDED.—Many friends in Charlottetown will be sorry to learn that Private Jerry Quinn, who left here with the 105th Battalion has been wounded. Word to this effect was received by his foster-mother, Mrs. Morgan of this city. Jerry was a well known Charlottetown newsboy and prior to enlisting worked for a while at the Victoria Hotel.

SAD NEWS.—The sincere sympathy of her many friends will go out to Mrs. Casey, wife of Mr. F. J. Casey Collector of Inland Revenue, Charlottetown, in the death of her brother, Sergeant James McCarthy, who died of wounds in France on Wednesday last, Sept. 4. The first intimation of his being wounded reached Charlottetown about a week ago, when the telegram stated, he was dangerously ill. The late Sergeant McCarthy, who is a son of Mrs. Elizabeth McCarthy, St. John, N. B., enlisted shortly after the outbreak of the war with the 6th Canadian Mounted Rifles and proceeded quickly to France, where he has been in the thick of the fighting ever since. He was wounded earlier in the war, but recovered sufficiently to return to duty. For conspicuous bravery he was promoted on the field. Sergeant McCarthy was 23 years of age and was very popular in his own city of St. John, where his death will be keenly felt by his friends and acquaintances.

ISLANDERS IN CASUALTY LIST

Yesterday another name that of J. William Stanway, was added to the roll of the Island's honoured dead, when the sad official word came to his parents Captain Herbert Stanway, R. O. of the sixth Fusiliers of Montreal and Mrs. Stanway. He went overseas as Sergeant with the 37th Canadian Field Artillery, Winnipeg. He was accountant in the Canadian Bank of Commerce when he enlisted, and he persuaded twenty other young fellows to join the colors. He left St. John on February 29th 1916, and three months later he went to France. He was at Rouen for 22 months on the staff of the Assistant Adjutant General, but gave up his rank to go to the firing line in the 39th Battalion, the 37th having been wiped out.

All the time he was in Rouen he was very desirous to get to the front, and his desire was frequently expressed in his letters written to his relatives here. Finally by reverting to the rank of private he succeeded in getting to the front.

A letter recently received in Charlottetown from his brother, stated that he had taken a course in artillery machine gunnery and received a first class certificate.

Private Stanway, who made the supreme sacrifice at the age of 23, began his banking career in this city with the Canadian Bank of Commerce.

He leaves to mourn besides his parents, in this city, one brother, Captain George Stanway, of the Canadian Army Service, Inspector of Camps at Willey, and one sister, Miss Rose Stanway, whose splendid work in connection with the 105th Comforts circles and other activities for the benefit of the soldiers has made her name a household word in the province. To the bereaved the Guardian tenders deepest sympathy.

Mr. William Bradley, 28 Spring Park Road, yesterday received the sad word of the death in action in France of his son, Private Allan James Bradley. Deceased was one of three brothers gallantly serving overseas. Deceased left here with the 105th Battalion transferring later to the 104th and to the 26th. He was only 19 years of age and his death is a hard blow to his parents and the others of the family.

It is only about two months ago that another son Joseph Neil was wounded; the other one overseas is at present engaged in hospital work in England. There are also two younger brothers at home and two sisters, and one in the United States and to all deepest sympathy is extended.

MacPhee was twenty-one years of age. He enlisted in January, 1916, in the 105th at Charlottetown. He went into action in France five months previous to his death. There are left to mourn besides his sorrowing father and mother, four sisters and eight brothers, Thomas and Fred are now serving in England. The sympathy of their many friends will go out to the bereaved in their sad loss.

Mr. Moses Arsenault, Summerside, also received the very sad intelligence by wire yesterday that his son Pte. Germain Arsenault had been killed in the big drive of August 28th.

Word was received in Summerside, yesterday that Pte. Sterling McKay, son of Mr. Alexander McKay, Graham's Road, had been killed in action. He left here with the 105th and before enlisting worked in the employ of Messrs Sinclair and Stewart.
