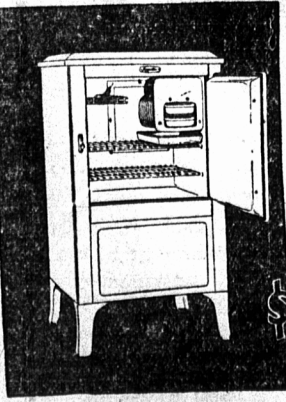

IN MEMORIAM CENTRAL GUARDIAN

JOHN J. MCADAM On the evening of Wednesday, May 25th the Angel of Death, with the proverbial swiftness of lightning, came and called John J. McAdam at the age of 74 years.

On his failing to return to the house, a search was made and terrible was the shock received when his unconscious body was found by his son Roderick. His Pastor and Physician were immediately summoned, and on arrival everything possible was done to restore life but to no avail, he having expired shortly after their arrival without regaining consciousness.

Although he had attained the age of 74 years, it was seemingly apparent to all that he would be spared for some years to come, and the tragic suddenness of his death greatly intensifies the sorrows accompanying the passing of a beloved one.

The memory of the late Mr. McAdam, or as he was familiarly known as John Joe, will be cherished by many as his cheery optimistic nature and great fund of humor had greatly endeared him to all which was amply evidenced by the vast throngs who called to pay their last tribute of respect.

His home was open to all, and with his life partner, took the greatest pleasure in dispensing kind hospitality to all, friend and stranger alike.

Of a family of six brothers and three sisters, only two brothers are left, Robert Bruce in Everett, Wash., and Alexander J., in Dorchester, Mass. Besides his grief-stricken wife, there are left to mourn, Roderick F., on the home-stead; Alban B., at Morell; Ella, Mrs. Alex. McKenzie at Scotchfort; Eunice, Mrs. Vincent Murphy, at St. Peters; Irene, Mrs. Edward Rossiter and Marion, Mrs. Jas. B. Jay at Morell, besides a large number of grand children.

His funeral which was very largely attended took place on Friday, May 27th, to St. Andrew's Church, the Requiem Mass being sung by his Pastor, Rev. A. P. McLellan assisted by Rev. J. B. McIntyre of Tracadie and his nephew, Rev. Reginald McDonald of Indian River.

The pall bearers were: J. P. McIntyre, J. B. McDonald, Rudolph McEachern, Bennett McDonald, Robert McKay and Benj. McEwen.

THOMAS E. POWELL On May 11th, 1932, many hearts were deeply saddened by the unexpected death of Mr. Thomas E. Powell, who was born in the year 1873 and resided the greater part of his lifetime in Emerald Junction.

Mr. Powell, although in failing health for a few months, was not thought to be seriously ill and did not linger as long as expected, but passed peacefully away on the above mentioned date, after having received the rights of the Holy Catholic Church, administered by his pastor, Rev. Francis MacDonald, who frequently visited him during his illness.
