MONEY TO LOAN

HUGE PENSION BILL IS PAID BY BRITAIN

LONDON, May 13.—The House of Commons continues to plow rapidly through the estimates, in anticipation of its early dissolution. Today those of the Ministry of Pensions, totalling nearly \$270,000,000, one of the largest single votes of all the Civil Service estimates, were introduced.

Right Hon. G. C. Tryon, Minister of Pensions, said the actual beneficiaries under the pensions schemes numbered a million and a half. "At the end of the present year," he stated, "we shall have spent \$4,565,000,000 on war pensions, compared with France's \$2,500,000,000 and Germany's \$2,000,000,000. The Ministry is only expending for administration 11 cents to every \$5 granted in pensions, compared with 30 cents in 1920."

The remarriage of a number of widows, and the fact that a number of children of widows had reached the age of 16, the Minister said, had contributed to a decline in expenditure on pensions. The estimates were passed.
