Miss Wilkinson's Successor As Minister of Education

LONDON, Feb. 15 — Mr. Attlee has filled Miss Edna Wilkinson's place as Minister of Education by transferring Mr. George Tomlinson from the Ministry of Works, which he has occupied since the Government was formed, Alderman Charles William Key, Parliamentary Under-Secretary of the Ministry of Health, becomes Minister of Works. Mr. Tomlinson takes Miss Wilkinson's place in the Cabinet and Mr. Key, though not a Cabinet Minister, becomes a Privy Councillor.

Mr. Tomlinson was educated at a Lancashire elementary school and began work in a cotton mill when aged twelve. Becoming a Trade Union Secretary, he was elected to

Parliament just before the war

and served in the Coalition Government under Mr. Bevin as Joint Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Labour and National Service. He was President of the Association of Education Committees on the Lancashire County Council.

The Education Ministry, which has been becoming increasingly important, is very much to the fore this year, when the school-leaving age is being raised in April from fourteen to fifteen. A most ambitious programme of teacher-training and school improvement

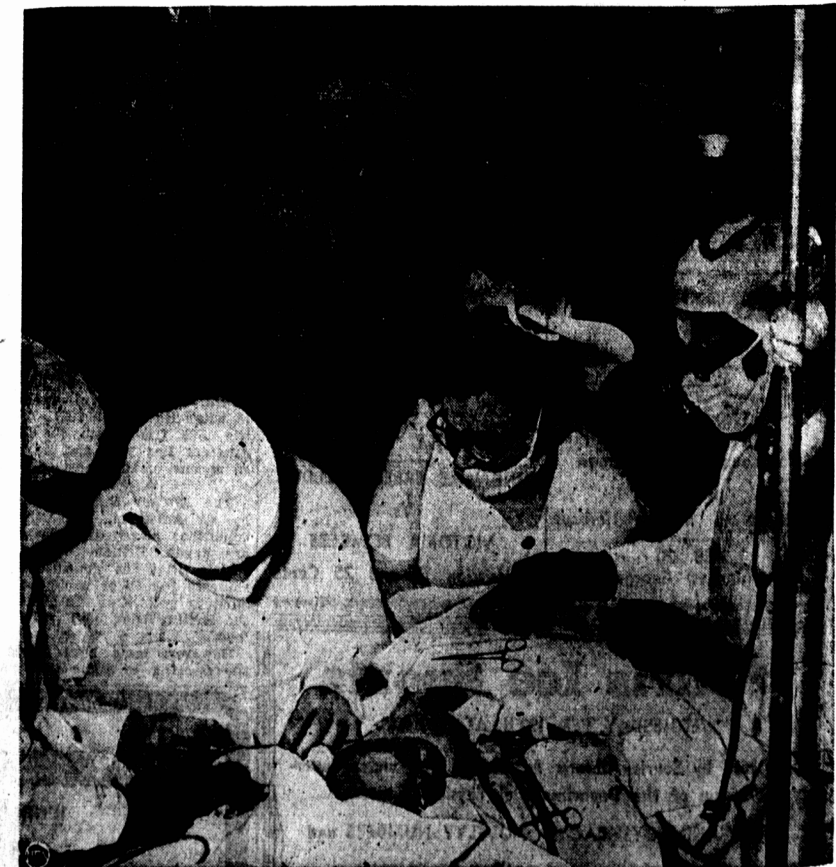
is in progress. Mr. Key has great experience of local government, to which he has added a knowledge of postwar housing problems during his appointment at the Ministry of Health. His chief charge, Mr. Bevan, is in general charge of housing, and Mr. Key goes to the Ministry of Works, which has great responsibilities in building, well equipped for his task.
