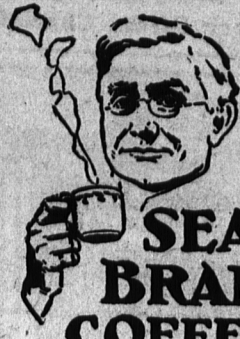

..AN HISTORIC SPOT.—Mr. Hugh Yoston of Georgetown has gone to Naufrage to take charge of the new lobster packing establishment which Mr. W. D. Coffin of St. Peters is erecting at the former place. The new building will be one hundred and sixty feet in length with other dimensions in proportion and will be fitted up in the most approved manner. Mr. Coffin is a veteran lobster packer having for many years concluded one of the largest packing establishments on the Island at Cable Head West with a branch factory at Hollow River. The Cable Head factory is now owned and operated by Mr. J. H. Rattray of St. Peters the one at Hollow River by Mr. John P. Sutherland. Last year Mr. Coffin carried on a cod and mackerel fishery at Naufrage, which was in charge of Mr. Yoston and was eminently successful. This year he intends having the largest lobster packing establishment on that part of the North Side. The construction of the boat harbor at Naufrage has been of inestimable benefit to the fish industry on this part of the coast as it has made possible the remarkable development in that line which has taken place since the harbor was open. Besides Mr. Coffin's factory, Messrs Harry Cox of Morell who recently purchased the packing establishment of Mr. Daniel O'Hanley, John Bryan and Eneas McAulay have factories in this vicinity giving employment to large numbers of men and women during the season and distributing thousands of dollars among their employees. Naufrage is about fifteen miles east of St. Peters Harbor which it bids fair to rival as a fishing station, and is the only place of refuge for fishermen and has the only lighthouse on the North Side from St. Peters Harbor to East Point, a distance of forty miles. It is also a place of considerable historical interest having been the site of a considerable settlement during the occupation of the Island by the French. Traces of this settlement are still plainly visible such as old cellars etc., and many French coins have been

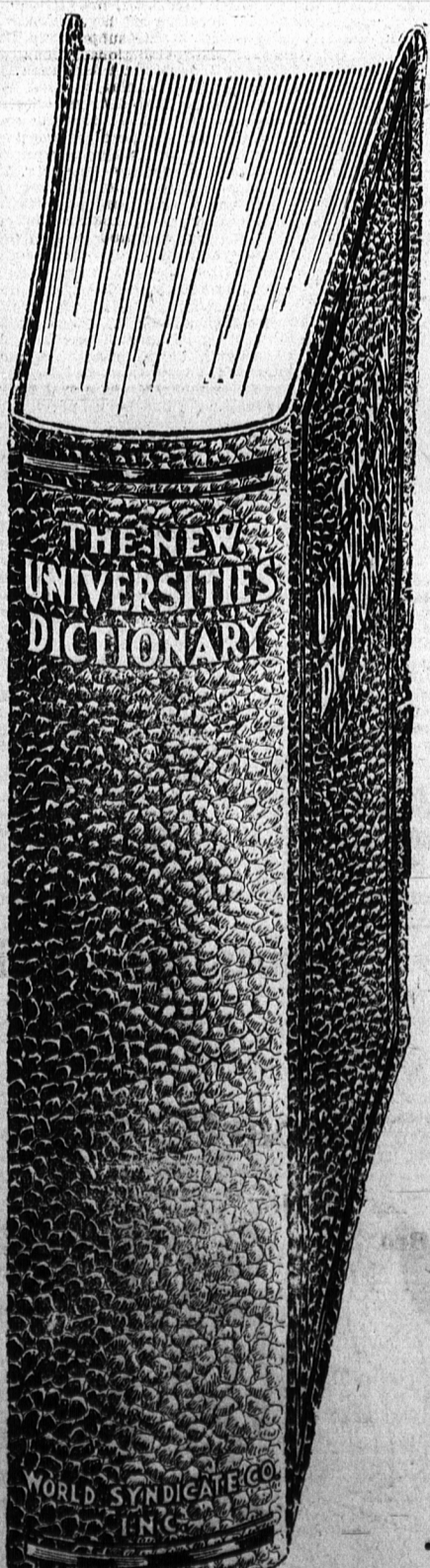
