The following are the city market prices:—Ducks per pair one dollar to one twenty-five, chickens per pair seventy-five to one dollar, pork per lb eight and three quarters cents, geese each one dollar to one twenty-five, turkey per lb sixteen to eighteen cents, butter per lb twenty-two to twenty-three cents, eggs per dozen nineteen and twenty cents, hay pressed per ton eight dollars and straw loose per ton five dollars, hay loose per cwt. forty-five to fifty cents and straw loose per cwt. thirty, white oats forty-seven to forty-eight cents and black oats fifty to fifty-two cents.
