(Continued from page 5) The second days racing held on Wednesday brought out an attendance of over 6,000 people. The 2.14 trot was a corking contest, six fast starters taking part. Abbe Worthy 2.05, owned by Mrs. Charles Ballard, North Sydney, and driven by "Billy" Hood won the first and third heats by narrow margins from Edna Klyo 2.11 from the Keyes stable. Edna won the second heat. Chestnut Dillon raced exceptionally well being second in the first and second heats. Abbe Worthy in trotting the first heat in 2.10 1/4, established a new track trotting record displacing that of Bill Sharen made in 1920 which was 2.11 1/4. The 2.12 pace was won by Captain Mac owned by Colin McKenzie, Truro, who turned the tables on Billy Cope who had previously defeated him at Montague and New Annan, best time 2.13 1/4. The 2.17 pace was won by Marjorie M., 2.11 1/4, owned by Kazoff & Jabalee, who had been cleaning things up in Cape Breton and beat a good field in this class, best time 2.12. Owing to a deluge of rain on Thursday the program of races for that day had to be carried over until Friday. This was a terrible disappointment as many thousands had come from all parts of the province to see the great big free for all, which was to bring together the greatest bunch of free for allers which had ever faced each other in the Maritimes. On Friday the track was fairly good and a fine program resulted. The 2.20 class trot was the first event and was won by Shenandoah, 2.08 1/4, a remarkable trotter owned by Jacob Vickers, North Sydney, N. S. He made it three straight, best time 2.14 1/4, Worthy Louise winning second honors. The free for all was of course the big attraction of the afternoon, Eula H. 2.06 1/4, Volo Rico, 2.04, Trampsmug, 2.02 1/4, Ruby P., 2.04 1/4, Lambert Todd, 2.02 1/4, Janette Royal, 2.04 1/4, and Bonnie M., 2.02 1/4 being the starters. The first heat was won by Eula H. in 2.10 1/4 with Volo Rico second. In the second heat Eula H. paced in 2.08 lowering the track record which was 2.08 1/4 made by John R. Braden in 1921. The third heat provided the sensation of the meeting when half way down the home stretch Volo Rico was pulled out and in an exciting finish beat Eula H. to the wire, time 2.08 1/4. Eula H. was owned by the Keyes Stable, St. Stephen, N. B. The 2.21 class pace was another great contest, Sunbeam, 2.12 1/4 owned and driven by George W. Reed, Fort Fairfield, Maine, making it three straight with Del Volo, 2.13 owned by Monte Gerow second. The fastest time was 2.12 1/4. The four days program was completed on Saturday with three splendid races. The 2.23 class trot was won by Shenandoah, a double winner at the meeting. The first heat went to Jack Evans, owned by Monte Gerow and driven by Wellington McNeill, Jack was distanced the second heat, Golden getting second money and forcing Shenandoah to trot in 2.12 1/4. The 2.15 class pace was a wonderful race with Marjorie M., Miss Winnipeg, Grandma, Billy Cope, Lucky Lindy, Maxine the Great and Real Worthy. The first heat was an eyelash finish between the first five horses the time being 2.11. Marjorie M. made it three straight, proving herself to be a real race mare. The 2.27 trot Maritime bred brought out nine starters and was won by Bingen

Aubrey, a former pacer owned by Colonel D. A. MacKinnon, Miss La Aubrey won the first heat and the fastest in 2.17 1/4. A review of harness racing in Prince Edward Island would not be complete without some reference to the part played by Prince Edward Island horses on other Maritime tracks. The Halifax Exhibition race meeting was a disappointment in that it rained almost continuously the entire week, making it uncomfortable and causing the postponement or calling off of many of the events. The principal features of the meeting as far as the Island horses were concerned was the winning of the 2.25 trot Maritime bred by Bingen Aubrey, with Miss La Aubrey second, and winning the first heat. Jacqueline was third in the 2.26 trot and pace, The Willys being fourth. Chestnut Dillon was fourth in the 2.14 trot which was won by Hollywood Lea, who by the way established a new Maritime trotting record of 2.09 1/4. Calumet Bernice was fourth in the three year old trot and pace. Lucky Lindy was second in the 2.13 trot and pace to Captain Mac, Billy Cope being third. Golden won the 2.24 trot after Miss La Aubrey had captured the first heat in the fast time of 2.13 1/4. Kitty McKane was third and Pickle fourth in this race. The 2.25 pace was won by Jacqueline in straight heats, The Willys getting third money. The free for all was won by Eula H. with Volo Rico second. Eula H. established a new track record pacing of 2.08. In the twenty-four trot and pace The Willys was second to Single Todd. In the 2.17 trot Hollywood Lea won in straight heats with Frank J. Ortolan second. The 2.17 pace was won by Lucky Lindy with Pat McKenna holding the lines. Lindy won in straight heats. Fredericton followed Halifax and several Island horses started there. The Willys going an excellent race in the 2.24 pace and being a close second in 2.12. Lucky Lindy won a sensational race in the 2.16 class beating out some high class horses. The 2.22 trot was won by Golden, who took a new record of 2.12, which is the fastest record for a green trotter in the Maritimes. In the free for all Volo Rico was third to Eula H. and Ruby P. In the 2.13 class Lucky Lindy was second to Sassy Marie, best time 2.10. In the three year old trot and pace Volunter from the Keyes stable won, making a new three year old trotting record of 2.17. Mr. Squires, owned by Wellington McNeill was third and Calumet Bernice fourth. The races at Woodstock held the same week as Fredericton, were featured by the starting of several Island horses. Peter Dawes made a most creditable showing, starting in two races one of which went to five heats. Peter won two heats from a fast bunch of pacers in 2.14 on a heavy track and was second to Peter Pokey in the 2.16 trot. Grandma, owned by Rankin McLaine, also showed up well in her race, winning second money, while Captain Jackson was a money winner also. Amherst followed Fredericton, a great contest taking place there between Lucky Lindy, Marjorie M., Billy Cope, Grandma, etc., Lucky Lindy winning the race, best time, 2.12. Marjorie M., second. Billy Cope third and Grandma fourth. On the same afternoon Shenandoah beat Golden and Peter Dawes best time 2.14 and The Willys played with his opposition winning easily, best time 2.14. In October Lucky Lindy paid a visit to Cape Breton and cleaned up the 2.17 class which had as starters Marjorie M. and others, later on winning the free-for-all at North Sydney. Lucky Lindy finished the year as the outstanding race win-

ner of the provinces, winning nine races. Golden, 2.12, was the fastest green trotter in the Maritimes. Volo Rico paced the fastest third heat in the Maritimes and the fastest mile by a horse owned in Prince Edward Island, 2.08 1/4. Lucky Lindy and Billy Cope by each pacing a mile in 2.12 were the two fastest Maritime bred horses on Maritime tracks. Bingen Aubrey won the fastest mile by a trotting gelding in the Maritimes 2.17 1/4. The fastest mile of the year by a province bred trotter on a provincial track was by Miss La Aubrey owned by Warren & McArthur, Kensington, and driven by Tyndie Semple, winning the first heat in Halifax in 2.13 1/4. The Willys, owned by Charles Reardon and driven by Pat McKenna was the fastest Maritime bred green pacing gelding, winning at Amherst in 2.14. Jolyset, owned by C. A. Bennett, Murray River, was the fastest provincial bred three year old trotter with her mile in 2.20 at Montague. Bingara Todd owned by A. W. J. Borden, was the fastest four year old stallion in the Maritimes with a record of 2.20. A feature of this years races at the Provincial Exhibition was the attendance of "Billy" Keyes with his very fine string of race horses. It was expected that they would make a complete clean up, but as usual the Island horses took their fair share of the awards. The Mayor Prowse Trophy for the leading driver during the meeting was won by Mr. Keyes with thirty points, Colonel D. A. MacKinnon being second with eighteen points. The Cape Breton horses made a rather exceptional showing at the Exhibition, winning \$1,500, Nova Scotia, \$850, New Brunswick, \$1,480 and P. E. I. the largest amount, \$1,830. There were 19 heats paced during the meeting, the fastest being the second heat of the free for all, won by Eula H. in 2.08, the slowest being the second heat of the three year old trot and pace won by Joe the Great in 2.20 1/4. There were 17 heats trotted during the meeting, the fastest being by Abbe Worthy in 2.10 1/4, a new track record, the slowest heat trotted was in the three year old trot and pace by the trotter Volunter in 2.20. The average time of the 19 heats paced was 2.13 1/4 and the average time of the 17 heats trotted was 2.14 1/4. Both are new record averages for this province. The competition for driving honors around the Prince Edward Island Circuit was very keen between the stables of Colonel D. A. MacKinnon and Wellington McNeill. The former campaigned Volo Rico 2.04, Billy Cope 2.11 1/4, Golden 2.12, Worthy Louise 2.15, Bingen Aubrey 2.17 1/4, (trotting) and Calumet Bernice. Mr. McNeill had Lucky Lindy 2.12, The Incense 2.10 1/4, Jessica the Great 2.14 1/4, The Willys 2.14, Mr. Squires, Great Village Belle, and also drove Jack Evans one race. Colonel MacKinnon totalled 57 points and Mr. McNeill 54 points. A feature of the season's racing was the driving of Pat McKenna, who took over the Wellington McNeill string while Mr. McNeill was suffering from a severe cold contracted at Halifax. Pat drove Lucky Lindy to wins at Halifax, Fredericton, Amherst and North Sydney and won with The Willys at Amherst in 2.14, a new record, also won places with him at Fredericton and Halifax. Abegweits Win From Tigers 5-1 HAWKS TRIM RANGERS 1-0

Local Team Play In Second And Third Periods Undoing Of Campbellton.

Playing listless hockey and at the same time lagging on the small side of a one to nil score in the first period, Abegweits looked like anything but "B" Section Northern Hockey League leaders in their game with Campbellton at the Forum last evening. In fact it was one of the most ragged first session exhibitions shown by Abbies this year. However, on the resumption of play in the second canto, team play, that all important feature of hockey, crept into the picture and Abegweits were soon scoring goals, and before the final gong clanged, the homesters were out in front 5 goals to 1. Campbellton played fairly good hockey up front, but showed a weakness behind the blue line that stood out in bold relief against the fast skating of the red and black forwards.

The fixture, taken as a whole was nothing to rave about, and if Abegweits turn in the same first period exhibition against Dalhousie Rangers tomorrow night, it will be just too bad for the Hickeson clan. Four of the Abegweits counts were registered as the result of team play, two on rebounds and two on combination.

Both goalies, Champoux, of Campbellton, and Stull, Abbie net minder, turned in a great game between the pipes, the former turning aside 34 shots on his citadel, while Stull kicked out 17. The latter, although the least worked of the two, gave a splendid exhibition, turning aside dangerous close in shots.

Campbellton opened the scoring four minutes from the face-off, when Thomas, fast left winger carried well in over the blue line to let drive at Stull. The latter kicked the rubber out, but before he could clear, Robinson, centre man, raced in to take another shot at the busy goalie, who again made a brilliant stop only to be trimmed hands down when Howard, right winger, caught the second rebound and rifled the vulcanite into the draperies. Campbellton surely earned the goal, especially when one considers that the entire front line figured in the play.

SECOND PERIOD

Four minutes later Doucet took a hand at scoring on a pass from Lawlor and five minutes from the latter goal, Squarebriggs bagged his second goal of the night on a pass from Nicholson, who carried the puck to the corner and slipped it neatly to the wily "Snag."
