MEETS HIS FIANCEE WHO HAS BEEN DRIVEN INSANE.

NEW VICAR March 26—Walter H. Thompson of Chicago met his fiancée, Miss Margaret Reynolds, at the pier, when the steamer Verona docked yesterday, to welcome her home from India, where she has been a missionary.

Instead of the girl who left him two years ago, he found a gray-haired woman, of 21, bereft of reason, who failed to recognize him.

Miss Reynolds had been in the famine-stricken regions of India. The suffering she saw there drove her insane and at times had to bring her back. Mr. Thompson and the nurse are taking her home to Waterloo, Ia.

SEAL FISHERY CONDITION REPORTED BAD

HALIFAX, N. S., March 27—J. A. Farquhar & Co. received a wireless message from Captain Farquhar of the sealing steamer Seal, which is now at the fisheries, to the effect that the Gulf fleet had made very slow progress during the week. They were only able to steam through 30 miles of ice, which is this year exceptionally heavy.

The seals at the present time are ten miles from the steamer. On last Friday men were sent out and walked to where the pack was located. This was done under extreme difficulty, owing to the condition of the ice fields. They killed one thousand, but were compelled to leave them on the ice, as the weather prevented the carrying of them to the ship. The prospects will not be any more encouraging unless there is a heavy northeast wind, and at present conditions are most unfavorable.

FOX NEWS

When R. A. Taylor, the manager of The Smith Silver Black Fox Co., Montague, went in to feed the foxes Friday he was agreeably surprised to find the fourth female had given birth to a litter. This makes the fourth litter for the Smith Co. Another is expected next week. The last share of stock in The Smith Silver Black Fox Company was sold on Saturday afternoon. Over \$22,000 dollars worth was taken by Charlottetown investors in a very short time. The issue of stock was placed by McKinnon and Newcome of the Canadian Fox Exchange, they becoming interested for a large block themselves. They feel they have the best lot of propositions of today.

The Smith Company have four litters now and expect another in a few days. This should give a very large amount available for dividends, as there are absolutely no expenses until after September first.

MARITIME K. O. F. CONVENTION AT HALIFAX

HALIFAX, N. S., March 26.—Knights of Columbus from all over the Maritime Provinces were in convention here this afternoon and evening when a large number took their degrees. This afternoon in the second council rooms, Rev. Dr. Foley, chairman of Halifax Council, assisted by J. A. East, exemplified the second degree to about forty-five candidates.

In St. Mary's Parish Hall tonight, W. J. Mahoney, of St. John, past state deputy, exemplified with his team the third degree to about thirty-five applicants. There were nearly 300 Knights in session and to-night the visitors attended a banquet and smoker given by the local members of the Columbian order.

LIEUT. CLARK EXPIATES CRIME ON THIS SCAFFOLD

ALLAHABAD, British India, March 26—Lieut. Clark of the Indian army medical department, was hanged here today for the murder of Mr. Fulham, an assistant examiner of military accounts of which he was found guilty on March 1 by the supreme court of Agra.

He died without flinching and did not speak while on the scaffold. He was buried in the military cemetery of the garrison, an army chaplain officiating.

The trial of Lieut. Clark and of Mrs. Fulham, his accomplice, caused a great sensation in India. They were charged together with poisoning Mr. Fulham and attempting to murder Mrs. Clark, the male prisoner's wife. Clark was found badly wounded in the head on November 17 last, and later died of her injuries, while Mr. Fulham died in October. The crime was discovered owing to the finding of correspondence which had passed between the two prisoners.

PICKING OUT THE ROYAL TROUSSEAU

BERLIN, March 27—The Kaiserin and Princess Louise Victoria are holding daily inspection of the linens and dress goods, selecting the trousseau for the future duchess. It has been decided to use only German linen and wear German lace for Louise's underwear. Only the white things she will wear on her wedding day are adorned with Brussels lace, owned by the royal family for years and years. As Louise is somewhat of a draftee, she made her own patterns for her table linens, insisting that everything be made in Germany.

GOV. FOSS VETOES COURT RECORD BILL

BOSTON, March 26—Governor Eugene N. Foss has sent to the house a veto of a bill to prevent communicating to a court the fact of a former conviction of a defendant in police district and municipal courts. The governor says he favors the purpose of the bill, but this particular form of the bill would prevent introducing records of value in probate cases. He says he has received earnest protest against the bill from the chief justice of the supreme court with suggestions as to how to remove the objection. With the veto he sends the draft of the bill to accomplish the same purpose, but not having the objectionable features of the former bill.

The house has suspended its rules and admitted the petition for a law to permit the state, counties, cities and towns to pay money to their employes under the workmen's compensation act.

The house also admitted a similar petition from the progressive legislative bureau. In the senate the committee on fisheries and game has reported a bill that the salaried deputies on the fish and game commission may be authorized by commissions to kill at any time in the most humane manner possible pheasants which have been satisfactorily shown have committed serious damage to crops. The same committee reports a resolve for an investigation by the fish and game commission in regard to damage of crops by pheasants also whether pheasants will eat the gypsy moth and to report by January 1, 1914.

BOTTLE TOLL WEALTH OF EMPRESS EUGENIE

PERIGAN, France, March 27—Soldiers have discovered near the old fortifications at Mottlouis a buried bottle containing what purports to be an inventory of jewels and money entrusted to Manuel Berez for conveyance to the mother of Empress Eugenie at Madrid. The document stated with the seals of the second empire, and is dated September 4, 1870. It places the value of the jewels, which were presents from European Sovereigns to Empress Eugenie, at 4,600,000 francs, and the money at 200,000 francs. Close to the bottle a skeleton was unearthed.

PRESIDENT'S TROUBLES JUST STARTING

WASHINGTON, March 25—One man in every 47 who voted for Woodrow Wilson for president is a candidate for office under the Democratic administration. In other words there are on file at the ten executive departments of the government 131,580 applications for jobs. There are just 10,384 jobs available for office seekers. President Wilson, the members of his cabinet, senators and representatives are now engaged in the difficult task of parceling out these places. When all have been filled there will be 121,146 disappointed applicants. Postmaster-General Burleson will have more offices to fill, than any other member of the cabinet. He will have to select 844 presidential postmasters alone, for which there are already on file at the department over 80,000 applications. Presidential postmasters are appointed for a four-year period.

MAINE STATE HAS A FISH FAMINE

PORTLAND, Me., Mar. 26—Storms along the Maine coast have interfered greatly with the operations of the fishermen, and the Portland markets have been without fish most of the time since last November. "All through the Lenten season there was only half enough cod, haddock, cusk or halibut to supply the local market. The first fishermen to reach Portland with a load after a storm of four or five days' duration received phenomenal prices. A York man fishing in a power dory a few miles from shore hooked a good sized halibut and landed it after an hour's struggle. There had been no halibut in Portland for two weeks. He headed for this port and received \$40 for his fish.

A Peak's Island lobster fisherman obtained \$9 for four lobsters. They were not unusually large ones at that. Frank Woodbury, of Long Island, six miles from here, made a remarkable catch last week. Off the Cape Elizabeth lights he took from his trawl two cod. One weighed ninety pounds and the other eighty.

A few days ago Captain Downey, of the Gloucester fishing schooner Josephine caught simultaneously on one line two cod which weighed one hundred pounds. The larger weighed sixty pounds. While the average size codfish is from five to ten pounds, generally it is landed easily by simply "keeping him coming" all the time the big streak cod of from fifty to a hundred pounds upward furnish a man's battle before they give up the struggle.

CANADA IN CLOSE TOUCH WITH JAPAN

OTTAWA, March 26.—The subjects of Canada and of Japan will soon be upon closer terms socially and commercially. The Canadian government, through a bill to be introduced in the house of commons this week by the prime minister, will signify its adherence to the British-Japanese commerce and navigation treaty of 1911, which places the subjects of either power upon terms of equality with native subjects in both countries as regards right of travel, residence, commerce, possession of property, immunity from extra taxation and reciprocal freedom of trade and commerce. The treaty also provides that articles, which are the produce or manufacture of either country shall not be subject to higher duties in the other than are levied upon similar articles from other foreign countries and that there shall be reciprocal freedom of shipping except as regards coasting trading.
