LIBRARIES HELP TO NAME BABIES

BROOKLYN, N. Y., April 6 - Naming babies has grown into big business for the Brooklyn public library with an average of 780 tiny newcomers each week in this "city of churches."

The libraries jumped in when citizens seemed no longer satisfied with "Junior" and so on. Even the old family names, earnestly carried through several generations, are being abandoned in favor of more high-sounding designations. The library system has two methods of filling the demand for names and there is a third method, for emergency use only. First, the name-speaker gets the benefit of information contained in a collection of the library next draws on its central registration office which has on record about 550,000 names.

If the patron still is not satisfied, the librarians sometimes resort to the third extreme of coining a new name. This has resulted in such inspirational products as Iambos, Glamourous, Stottaway and Flimpitz. The librarian-inventor of Flimpitz suggested that it be stowed upon "a bluish-eyed boy of rather piquant the unusual names filed last year include Axford, Basline, Eloraya, Earline, Edellus, Emleta, Florayne, General, Gurdeen, Heney, Keelaa, Linken, Meryren, Nykte, Pence, Permetia, Shu Smith, Vici-filla and Wyema. Names of this type frequently are requested by negro patrons.

The New York Herald-Tribune thinks the Brooklyn library has let itself in for plenty of trouble and is wishing to be helped in suggesting a study of ballplayers' names. "There were in another era, Tristram Speaker, Honus Wagner, Tyrus Cobb, and a bespectacled pitcher named Eppa Jephtha Rixey. And Wambans might be turned into a first name. And today there is an infielder named Lynn and a pitcher named Ivy Paul Andrews." The paper concludes its suggestions with the "relative's y strip" name of Keneshaw Mountain Landis, Uncle Sam's commissioner of baseball.
