Having addressed a meeting under the auspices of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society the previous evening she confined herself principally to description of the children; their manners, habits, etc., also of the methods and devices sometimes used by the teacher to get the children to attend school, for, not unlike many of their white little brothers and sisters, they are not always willing candidates for scholastic attainments. One unique method is to go early in the morning supplied with a stout stick and dig them out of the sand or wherever they may have hidden themselves. Her descriptions were not only interesting and instructive, but amusing and pathetic. Miss Blackadar is a fluent and pleasing speaker. At the conclusion of the meeting after the children had dispersed, most of the ladies present were invited to adjourn to the beautiful parlor in the hall, where a reception was given by the ladies of the Presbyterian church in their usual hospitable style. Some time ago Rev. A. E. Burke, of Alberton, becoming alarmed at the great spread of noxious weeds and the apathy of so many of the farmers of the province wrote to Prof. Fletcher, Ottawa, suggesting to him the necessity of a weed show and lectures to the farmers to make them acquainted with their enemies and the means of extirpating them. In reply to Father Burke's communication, Prof. Fletcher sends the following:

REV. A. E. BURKE, Alberton, P. E. I.
MY DEAR FATHER BURKE:—Your capital report has just come to hand, and as usual is as full of meat as an egg. Your suggestions about the weed show is an excellent one. At what time of the year do you hold your annual exhibition? That would be the time to have such a display. I do wish that your little Island was not quite so far off. With regard to oyster shell bark louse there are indications that we have a good remedy in simply spraying trees in autumn with ordinary lime whitewash.—1 lb fresh lime in 1 gallon of water. This shells off in the winter and carries the scales with it. It is cheap and apparently very effective.

A VERY large audience greeted Rev. Mr. McInnis in the basement of the Zion Church last evening when he delivered an address on "What Intemperance has cost the nation" under the auspices of the Y. P. S. C. E. The pastor of the church Rev. D. B. McLeod occupied the chair and in a short speech introduced the speaker of the evening. Mr. McInnis held the closest attention of his hearers for upwards of an hour. During the course of his speech the lecturer spoke of the evils of intemperance not only in Canada but throughout the whole world, and mentioned the fact that intemperance slays more men every year than combined armies of the entire world. He said that several years ago the United States rose up in arms against the Spaniards in defence of the Cubans and at that time they were highly praised for their efforts in behalf of those misruled people; but what have they done for them so far? When they entered Manila they found but three saloons, but inside of a year these had grown to four hundred. What the United States has done for Cuba in this way we are doing today for Africa India and Alaska. Year after year liquor is being poured into these places from Canada. In closing Mr. McInnis said that the question is what can we do, and contended that the first thing to do was to awaken the people of the church to a sense of their responsibility in this matter. During the evening vocal selections were rendered consisting of a duet by Mr. Stanley and Miss Fraser and solo by Mr. Stanley. The doxology was brought the successful meeting to a close.
