ROTARY

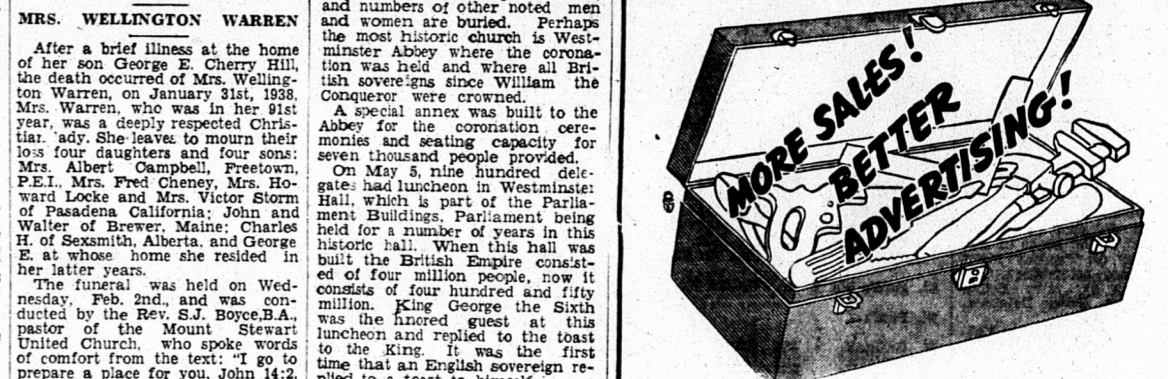
A visit to Great Britain and the continent of Europe at any time is a great experience, but to have the privilege of visiting when one has the opportunity of witnessing a sovereign crowned, meeting and conversing with members of the Royal Family, and British statesmen from all parts of the Empire, also diplomats from all nations of the world is a real experience never to be forgotten, said a local Rotarian, B. W. LePage, guest speaker at the Rotary Luncheon yesterday.

Rotarian Reuben Macdonald who was also present, during the Coronation was in the chair. Four seats in Westminster Abbey were reserved by the Secretary of State for representatives of the Province and Government, and Mr. LePage in the course of his address, His Honor, Lieutenant-Governor DeBlais and Mrs. DeBlais representing the Province, and Mrs. LePage and I the Government.

We arrived in Greenock, Scotland, on the 31st of April, where we found real summer weather with the grass as green as in the middle of June in this Province. Arriving in London on the next day we found London all dressed up, every street and every building was decorated with flags, banners, streamers, etc. London is a beautiful city built on both sides of the Thames River, mostly on the northern side. There are large parks in the very centre of the city, namely, Hyde Park, 361 acres, where soap-box orators daily condemn everyone from the Royal Family down, and are protected by the police; Regent Park, four hundred and seventy-three acres, in which is the finest zoological park in the world; also Kensington Park with two hundred and seventy-five acres.

London, it is said, is a city of churches, many of them dating back to the tenth century, black with age. The most historical church is Saint Paul's Cathedral, one of the best church edifices in the world. Here, on the 24th of May last four thousand delegates worshipped, including the Royal Family and many British statesmen. In the crypt of this church,

AUTHORITIES RULE ON THERMOSTAT LOCATION

Practicality, rather than beauty should guide the location of a thermostat. Unless it is wisely located, the heating of a house will not be properly controlled. A thermostat should be located on an inside wall, in a spot where it is protected from drafts caused by fireplaces, stairways, or the opening of outside doors. It is generally placed at a height of approximately five feet, but recent some authorities have recommended it be placed at a more desirable height
