

PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION

about three hundred yards between us. I could not tell what they were doing. A red horse stood quite near the vehicle. While we were measuring, Sergeant Bradley looked up and said the horse was gone. Bradley started up to see where the horse was gone and Pippy came down to meet him. I then went on to the factory and the officers went to look after the horse. I waited by the Baptist Church and the three of us went to my house. The officers reported that they could not get the horse and the baskets and children were gone. They went down to the barn but could not find the horse. Then the officers went to the bush where the horse had been tied and examined the foot prints very carefully taking careful measurements at Pippy's gate and at the bush. Campbell took the measurements and Bradley held the book. Care was taken not to make comparison of the different lengths until they were entered and then they were found to correspond. They went on east then to where the horse turned on the road and examined the track in my presence. The road was narrow for turning and the horse had apparently in turning destroyed the imprint to some extent, but we could tell it was the same shoe. It then got dark. I came to town on Sunday morning and papers were issued for the arrest. Bradley, Hooper, Campbell and Harper went down to make the arrest. I fell in with them when they were going to make the arrest. They could not find Pippy. We were talking at Pippy's gate when Wood came along the 48 road. They gave him in charge of Hooper and the others went back to the Five Mile House. The fire was burning North and South as indicated by the condition of the leaves on a tree quite near the buildings.

Cross examined by Mr. Johnson. The buildings were literally down when I got up. Both buildings were in the same condition when I awoke. I think that both barns were fired at the one time. I was closing out my egg business. I sometimes candle eggs in building No. 1. I proposed to ship them on the following day. I did not candle any eggs on the night of the fire. We had not been candling eggs for some time. I never got any threatening letters. There were not any sent to my family. My sons never told me that I would be burned out. I never carried fire arms for protection. Mr. Wood was subpoenaed against Murphy He referred on the boat to my shooting ducks below his place when his brother was dead in the house some 40 years ago. That was not the burden of his conversation. Wood threatened to cut me in two in a wagon. When he saw the hole he was in he said he would not hurt a hair in my head. I was at Mr. Jas. McCallum's to dinner a few days ago. Wm. Ballum and McGregor were present. I did not state there that I was sorry that Wood was arrested. I said I was sorry for his wife. I suspect him now. Wood threatened me all the way from the boat to his gate.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

In the afternoon Mr. Johnson continued the cross examination of Mr. Jenkins. Lemuel Wood is married to my sister. I do not know of the road from Pippy's gate being used generally. I swear the calk is the same as the pattern taken. I never saw a calk exactly like it. I would not swear which foot the calk was on. The pattern fitted the calk hole very closely. On the early part of the night on which the fire occurred I believe the wind was blowing from the east. The tree is about 15 feet from the barn. I do not know why a diamond calk is used on a horse shoe. As far as I can remember I never had any words with Mr. Pippy other than in the court before mentioned. I never laid any information against Mr. Pippy. I do not know whether Mr. Pippy runs the house or not. I do not know anything about their private affairs. Mrs. Pippy lives at the Five Mile House and a warrant was out for her arrest for a conviction obtained. I did not instruct or send any one to take the shoes off Mr. Pippy's horse.

Mr. Samuel Enman (sworn)—I am a native of Pownal but I have been living in Manchester for three years. I know Geo. Pippy and met him at the Long Swamp about the first of the month. I was going home. I was walking and he offered me a drive and I accepted. We were talking over different things and referred to Mr. Jenkins. Pippy said anyone who would do him a kindness he would never forget it. On the other hand if anyone would do him an injury he would never forgive and he thought it his duty to teach his children to remember it against the other's children. He (Pippy) said "I could go up to Jenkins' place and leave him without a home, but I won't do it." "I could go up there and leave him without a hoof (castle) but I will leave that to God Almighty." Pippy was under the influence of liquor at the time. I left Pippy at the Five Mile House. I have not had any conversation with him since, with the exception of passing

the time of day.

To Mr. Johnson.—Pippy was complaining about the way Jenkins had treated his wife.

Mrs. Ada Brown (sworn)—I live about a quarter of a mile from Mr. Jenkins. I was at home on the night of the 10th, my husband was away. I went to bed at eight o'clock. I got up when I saw the building on fire. The children disturbed me. I looked out and saw the buildings burning. I thought both were burning but could not say for sure. It was twenty minutes to twelve when I returned to my room. The fire was just breaking out through the buildings. As far as I could see the barns were burning inside, the flames bursting out. When I came out of my room a half hour after I first noticed the fire, the buildings were down and men were standing around. I did not see anyone around when I noticed the fire the first time. The fire was at its height about 12 o'clock.

To Mr. Johnson.—My husband serves Scott Act papers for Mr. Jenkins. The big building was between me and the small building.

Mrs. Caroline Acorn (sworn). I remember last Sunday. Geo. Pippy and wife were at our house sometime in the afternoon. They had a red horse and a buggy. They had tea between three and four. My husband was not home. I was talking to Mr. and Mrs. Pippy about the fire. They were remarking about the bad fire. Mr. and Mrs. Pippy did not say anything about who was blamed. They left our house before dark. I saw them going down the road but I did not watch them. My husband and my brother, (Robert Horton) came home before Mr. and Mrs. Pippy went away. Pippy came back again that night at dark. His wife was not with him. He came in a buggy. I was not talking to him after he came back. It was some time after night when he (Pippy) and Horton went away. I did not hear any conversation between Pippy and my brother. Pippy did not come in. I did not hear him say anything about Jack Stewart. I heard someone else refer to Stewart. I saw Pippy on Monday morning. I heard them saying Pippy was going to his brother's. It was before daylight on Monday morning when Pippy returned. My husband went down to see my brother and Pippy. He did not stay down long. I think they had a horse and buggy.

To Mr. Johnson.—There was nothing said about bail to my husband.

Sergeant Bradley (sworn)—I went to Mr. Pippy's gate on Saturday. We examined tracks which were fresh. Mr. Pippy was in a potato field. A red horse was loose in the field. We searched and found a clear print of a large shoe and measured it. Mr. Campbell did the measuring first from the toe calk to the heel on the left side, then from the toe calk to the heel right side. Then we measured across the heel and the breadth of the shoe at the widest point from outside to outside. The measurements were from heel to toe on left side 5 11-12, on right side shoe 6 inches, width of heel 4 1/2, width of shoe 5 1/2. There was a truck up in the field and a potato digger on it. Mr. Pippy was close to the digger. While we were measuring I looked up and observed that the horse was gone. I went up the hill to where the truck and potato digger was and I saw the horse in the hay field, possibly about five chains away. Pippy and I met near the digger and I asked if I could get through that way to the other road, and said I was walking. He asked me who was with me. I said Mr. Campbell. He enquired if it was Norman Campbell from town. I then came back and finished the measurements. Campbell and I afterwards went up through the potato field to get the measurement of the horse's shoe, but when we arrived Mr. Pippy, horse and children were gone. There is a barn in adjoining field but I could not find the animal there. I saw Mr. Pippy coming from his home through the new road. When we met, Pippy had a hoe in his hand. He asked us what we wanted and Campbell told him he was not wanted. If he was he supposed he (Pippy) would hit him with the hoe. We made a model of the calk (model produced) The diamond shaped calk was on the left side of the left foot.

We then went to the bush before going to Mr. Jenkins' house. We made measurements there without looking at the book. Campbell would call out the measurements and I found upon examination of the book that they all tallied. We tried the shape and it fitted. We then drove east past Mr. Jenkins' and found where the horse and carriage had turned. The road was on a slant and the imprint was not good and we could not get the breadth of the shoe. I afterwards had a search warrant to seize Pippy's horse but could not get the animal. Pippy gave himself up and after being placed in jail he gave an order for John Stewart to give the horse. He said he did not know where the horse was now, but he left it at Jack Stewart's. On Sunday we went to the Five Mile House but did not find him. I asked for Pippy but we could get no information. We supposed he was at his brother's. We met Mr. Jenkins and he told us that a Mr. Carver had told him that Geo. Pippy had gone to Southport. About that time Mr. Wood and his wife came along and I arrested Wood and sent him in charge of Mr. Hooper to the City. We went back to the Five Mile House but Pippy was not there. Coming round to the front of the house after we searched, I saw Mr. John Stewart standing between the shed and the house. There was a carriage in the shed in which we thought was Mrs. Stewart but we learned afterwards that it was Mrs. Pippy. Believing Pippy to be in Southport we came on to town. After arriving in the city we received information and we went across by special boat and went to the Five Mile House where we met a man who enquired what was the trouble. Holding up the lantern which we had with us I found

it was Mr. Horton. I then went to the back door of the house and instructed Harper to go to the front door. We heard some cracking and I saw a man along the line near the shed moving away. I made a few steps toward him and he ran. I called Harper and we pursued but it was very dark. I picked up a coat. When we returned the carriage was gone and we heard it rolling away. I got the horse at Stewart's harrowing a potato field. I looked at his feet and there were no shoes on the horse. I told Stewart there were no shoes on him and Stewart replied there were none on him when he got him. I got a blacksmith to examine the horse's feet. The fling on the hoof was quite plain. The horse was apparently shod only a few days. Bringing the horse from John Stewart's to the city without shoes crippled him. In removing the shoe it was apparent that the clinches were cut on the inside and the shoe torn off. All the hoof clear of the nails on the left side was torn off. There are three blacksmiths in Pownal. I went down yesterday and served subpoenas on them.

Cross examined by Mr. Johnson.—I do not know the length of the calks. The model would not change the shape of the hole. We did not tell Mr. Pippy what was wanted. Mr. Campbell may have remarked to Pippy that we were looking for stolen goods. The ground was soft at the gate.

Alexander Weatherbie, (sworn) On the morning after the fire I passed Mr. Jenkins. On the way I met Mr. Gay and one of Mr. Jenkins' sons. I met them about eight or nine chains from Jenkins' gate. They were looking at a wagon track. I looked at the track. It appeared as if the horse had come from the westward and had turned and in doing so backed a little. The road was narrow and the team turned and went westward. I afterwards went to Mr. Jenkins to look at the ruins. One of Mr. Jenkins' boys said he had seen some tracks out on the road. We started and went to see the tracks and saw where a wagon track had turned off the road where there was a bye road and the horse had apparently stood. The tracks in my opinion were made during the night.

Mr. Peters then intimated that as the hour was late the Crown would not call any further evidence and asked for an adjournment.

The counsel for the prisoner stated that as the evidence was not strong he purposed asking for bail for the prisoners.

His Honor said that in Wood's case he would permit a renewal of his bail. He could not, however, under the evidence admit Pippy to bail. The court then adjourned until Friday next.
