The other day the House of Commons at Ottawa accepted the principle of a resolution moved by Mr. Logan of Amherst, that the preferential tariff should apply to importations by way of Canadian seaports.

A By-Law for allowing a rate of discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general Civic purposes for the Current Year ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D., 1904.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows: 1st, a discount at the rate of 2% shall be allowed all tax payers who shall on or before the 25th day of July, next, A.
