The opening up of navigation has brought to light the fact that the fleet of motor boats in the harbor will be greatly strengthened this summer. A number of very fine models have been turned out during the past winter and several speedy launches are now ready for equipment. There is every indication that considerable rivalry will exist between owners of fast ones. With the splendid facilities for pleasure afforded by the waters of the harbor and river, it is little wonder that this splendid sport is gaining new adherents.

The new summer time table of the P. E. I. R. has been published. Trains leaving this city now are: West, 7.45 a.m. and 3.30 p.m. East, 6.45 a.m. and 3.20 p.m., and South at 3.10—all daily except Sunday. Trains leave Tignish at 5.00 a.m. and 12.15 p.m.; Souris at 6.30 a.m. and 1.10 p.m.; Georgetown at 6.20 a.m. and 1.15 p.m. and Murray Harbor at 6.40 a.m. Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday and 6.00 a.m. Monday Wednesday and Friday. The inward trains to this city will be from the West—11.30 a.m. and 9.00 p.m.; the East—9.15 a.m. and 5.20 p.m.; and the South at 9.25 a.m. and 9.35 p.m. Trains will arrive in Souris at 10.50 a.m. and 6.20 p.m.; at Tignish at 4.35 and 10.00 p.m.; at Murray Harbor at 7.00 p.m. Monday Wednesday and Friday and 5.55 p.m. Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday; at Georgetown 10.35 a.m. and 6.15 p.m.; and at Summerside from the west at 8.00 a.m. and 4.55 p.m. and the east at 9.25 a.m., 9.50 a.m. and 6.40 p.m.

The regular monthly meeting of the Y. M. C. A. Board of Directors was held last night at which several matters of special importance were discussed and acted upon. The organization of Boy Scouts was approved. The matter of securing a new general secretary to take the place of L. W. Archibald who resigned a month ago, was discussed and the name of J. M. Carson of Moncton, N. B., now of the Y. M. C. A. Training School, Springfield, Mass., was highly recommended and a committee was appointed to confer with him about the matter. General Secretary Archibald has accepted a call to Yarmouth, N. S., for August 1st. A committee on Bowling Alleys reported strongly in favor of first class alleys being put in, stating that considerable financial support had been promised by those whom they had consulted in the matter. A resolution was carried empowering the committee to look into the matter more fully as to the probable cost and to secure pledges sufficient to carry out the project.
