STOCKS GAIN SLIGHTLY IN N.Y. EXCHANGE

NEW YORK, Aug. 21—(A.P.)—Stocks improved in quiet trading today. Grains were erratic, but closed with narrow changes and shares reached their best levels after dealings had ceased on the Chicago Board of Trade.

RAILS FIRM

Gains were well distributed among the industrial equities. Rails were firm but utilities lagged. Steels "farm belt" stocks, chemicals, oils and repeal shares went ahead rather easily and throughout the session the market ruled above last Friday's close.

Returning to work from its long week-end, Wall Street apparently decided that happenings over the holiday had leaned toward the constructive side. Completion of the steel, oil and lumber codes and prospects that a coal agreement would soon be reached removed some uncertainties and brought so much nearer the end of the NRA drive and inauguration of the Government's campaign to stimulate consumer buying.

BUSINESS HOLDING

Labor Day, traditionally the end of summer dullness in industry, approaches with business holding a surprisingly large part of its advance. Steel production, says one trade review, has slipped back a few more notches, but the same periodical looks for good fall buying. Car-loadings also maintain, in general, their favorable comparisons.

BIRTH OF TRIPLETS BRINGS BOUNTY

OTTAWA, Aug. 21—Four Canadian families have received the King's bounty for the birth of triplets this year. The bounty of \$3 was first given by Queen Victoria, and has been continued by successive monarchs, though it was discontinued for a time during the reign of King Edward VII. On the file of the Secretary of State at Ottawa there is a letter from Lord Knutsford, Secretary of State for the Colonies, which is dated Feb. 6, 1892, and states: "Her Majesty the Queen has been pleased to grant assistance from her Royal bounty to married women in very poor circumstances among her subjects who have given birth to triplets, in order to enable the parents to meet the sudden expense thus thrown upon them." The Royal bounty is paid on condition that the children are British subjects, are born in wedlock and are all living at the time the application is made, which must reach His Majesty within four months after birth.

WOMEN TO OBSERVE PACT ANNIVERSARY

WASHINGTON, August 21.—Plans for a nation-wide observance of the fifth anniversary of the signing of the Kellogg-Briand peace pact on August 27 were announced yesterday by the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom.
