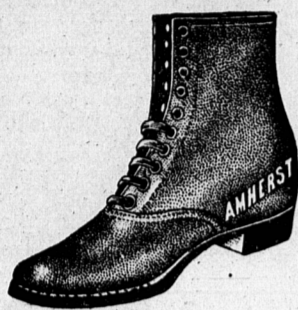

Among the articles offered at C.L. Grant's auction sale today are a fancy walnut parlor table with marble top, an oak flower stand, a solid walnut sideboard, an oak dining table, six oak dining chairs with leather seats, and an oak china closet.

Oddfellows in this city and Province will be interested in the following: According to the reports of the Grand Sire and Grand Secretary of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Oddfellows, submitted at the annual meeting, at Indianapolis, the year 1910 was a memorable one in the history of the order in the passing of the two million membership mark, the total membership at the close of the year, including only subordinate lodge members and sisters of the Rebekah branch, being 2,023,731. The subordinate lodge membership is 1,583,169, and the sisters of the Rebekah branch 440,562. The net gain in the subordinate lodge membership is 49,083, compared with 41,608 in 1909, while the net gain in Rebekah membership is sisters, 22,227, compared with 22,047 the previous year, and, brothers 10,695, compared with 7,247 for 1909. The total net membership in all branches during the year aggregates 85,369, compared with 72,600 for 1909. To the gain reported should be added the Patriarch Militants, 917, making the aggregate gains for the year 86,886. The total expenditure for relief in 1910 was \$5,711,049.41, against \$5,350,925.89 for 1909. The receipts of 1910 amounted to \$17,804,771.58, compared with \$16,827,728.66 in 1910. The largest fund of grand and subordinate bodies at the close of 1910 amounted to \$57,743,272.60, against \$53,156,910.14 at the end of 1909. Since 1830 the order has expended in relief \$136,698,390.08.

Harry Houdini, the well known magician and handuff artist who performed before and astonished many here, has created a sensation in Boston by freeing himself from a mass of knotted rope securely wound around his body. An exchange speaks of it as follows: "Harry Houdini made the escape of his life last night on the stage of Keith's Theatre, when he extricated himself from hundreds of knots and fathoms of rope, tied by four veteran T wharf fishing captains. In just 17 minutes he overcame turns, twists and knots tied by 25 to 40 years of experience. The knots probably is unequalled on the New England coast. In the theatre were hundreds of sailors and fishermen. On the stage was a large committee of seafaring men. They were men who could appreciate skillful knotting of cordage, for many a time their safety has depended on the trustworthiness of knots in ropes and lines. A long plank had been provided, on which Mr. Houdini was to be fastened on his back, with his hands made fast to a broom stick thrust under his legs. The fishermen first laid him on his back and lashed his wrists to the broom-stick, the cords cutting into the soft flesh. Then he was placed on his back on the plank and fathoms of rope wound about his body. Following this, more cord was tied and knotted about his legs and lashed to the end of the board. Not satisfied with this, the captains made fast their victim's head and neck. Finally they retired to the rear of the prostrate man and watched the struggle for freedom. For the first few minutes it seemed impossible that Houdini could get slack enough to escape. He struggled, but the cordage would not give. Houdini worked away, wiggling, pulling and twisting, until he kicked off one shoe. The other then followed, and soon he had slack enough in the ropes binding his legs to permit him to pull out with his teeth one of the knots that held his right hand. From that point progress toward freedom was rapid, for knot after knot was undone, while the audience cheered. When Houdini had freed his hands the rest was simple and he stood erect, bowing to the volley of cheers. "It was the hardest experience of my life," said Mr. Houdini, as he exhibited cuts and scars made by the ropes and cords."

Rev. Gordon Dickie, pastor of St. Stephen's Church, arrived in the city yesterday from the meeting of the Presbyterian Synod at Charlottetown. He said that the convention was one of the most successful that has ever taken place. There were more than 300 delegates present from different parts of Canada. A great many of those present were laymen. Dr. A. S. Grant, general superintendent of home missions for Canada, were present. In November, Sir Andrew Fraser and Robert E. Speers will speak on the Laymen's missionary movement at a convention to be held in this city.—St. John Ex.

The following from a Sydney exchange will be of interest here:—A Charlotte Street grocer says that butter is likely to be higher this fall. The dry summer has caused a shortage in Europe as well as in Canada, and much larger quantities are being exported from this country. As an instance it is stated that last week 5000 boxes were shipped from Montreal as against 500 boxes during the same period last year. The trough has tended to reduce the pack all over the country. Two carloads which recently arrived at Sydney cost three cents a pound more than a similar importation at this time last year. Advice from Montreal, today state that butter has advanced another cent on the market there."

BORDEN NOW SITS IN SIR JOHN'S CHAIR.

TORONTO, Oct. 6.—The old arm chair used by the late Sir John A. MacDonald, during the years of 1874 to 1878, when he was out of office and practising law in Toronto, has recently become the property of R. L. Borden, under romantic circumstances. When the personnel of the law firm of MacDonald and Mash changed, the old chair used by Sir John as senior partner, passed into the possession of the new senior partner, member of the firm of the late Wm. Lount, K. C. In 1900 when Mr. Lount was called to the bench, the chair was handed over to the junior member, George A. Kingston, the oldest conservative member of the firm. Some years later Mr. Kingston, as secretary of the Borden club of Toronto, attended a banquet given by the club in honor of the leader of the conservative party. He asked Mr. Borden when he should be premier of Canada to accept the present of the chair. Mr. Borden gave a ready assent and the chair has now been sent to the possession of the new senior partner.
