BANK'S SECURITIES ARE CANADIAN PROPERTIES.

LONDON, Oct. 26.—Alfred Carpenter the owner of the Charing Cross Bank which closed its doors on Oct. 17, yesterday issued a statement of the affairs of that institution. The number of creditors is about 25,000, and Mr. Carpenter placed the liabilities at £2,500,000. The assets include £144,000 in cash, £30,000 in book debts and shares, securities and properties of the value of £153,000.

The latter include shares in the Gaspe Lumber Trading Mills and Saw Mill, 40,000 acres of freehold land, timber rights and other properties at Gaspe valued at £10,000. There are also shares of a new Canadian company and about £300,000 worth of first mortgage debentures and all the common stock of the Atlantic, Quebec and Western Railway, the value of which is doubtful, but it is stated that Carpenter's expenditures on this road have been £1,250,000. There are also gold claims and mining rights in the Transvaal and doubtful value, of which the debtor
