Price Control Questions and Answers

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q.—For the past six months I have been paying 72c pound for tea. Now they have raised the price to 78c by packing the tea in four ounce lots. Is this legal?

A.—You will find the price of tea higher when buying in small lots. This is due to increased labor costs in packaging. Now that you are allowed to buy a month's supply of tea at a time and if you have two or more ration books in the family, your buying problem will be solved.

Q.—Is there a price ceiling on sausage and tomato catsup? I have seen charged two cents extra on both these items within two weeks.

A.—You should not pay more for sausage than the highest price you paid at the same store during the basic period. Each store has set its own ceiling on these canned items based on its basic period price. If you feel that your price is infringing on this regulation, please report the particular store and the dealer's name to the board office in your district for investigation.

Q.—Is a person liable for hoarding a tinies other than tea, coffee, and sugar?

A.—Yes. It is illegal for a consumer to stock up on quantities of any goods beyond the amount reasonably required for the use of the household.

Q.—Is there a price ceiling on the rate charged by an orchestra?

A.—This has charged \$2 per member last year has raised their price to \$3 a member.

Q.—Is there no ceiling on services of this kind.

A.—There is no restriction on the amount allowed to a customer but most retailers are attempting to see that their customers receive only a fair share of the available supply.

Q.—Are repair replacement parts for farm machinery rationed?

A.—No. And farmers are urged to check their machinery for needed repair parts so that machinery will be ready for operation well in advance of the spring season.

Dorothy Dix Says— Husband Wants Five Children, Freedom From Unfaithful Wife

Scared Children Better Off Away From Domestic Strife

DEAR MISS DIX: I am married and have five lovely children. I have a good job which would keep us comfortable if my wife would only help me, but she will not even provide us with wholesome meals. She buys most of the food ready prepared, which costs more than if she would cook it. She will not patch our clothes. She puts them in the rag-bag, when they could be saved by a little mending. She dells herself up nearly every night and steps out to some dance place. When I come home from a hard day's work she leaves me with the children to look after, one of them a baby.

She says she doesn't love me and she only stays because of the children. Lately I have been checking up on her and find out that she has been leading an immoral life. I don't want to leave my children, as I love them very much and they need me, as she neglects them, takes no care of them and leaves them alone while she goes honky-tonky. She curses me in front of the kids, and they scream as if they were scared to death when we get into a fight. I don't think it is fair to them to be brought up in such an environment. Is there any way I could get the children and get rid of her?

ANSWER: If it is true that your wife is leading an immoral life and neglecting the children, you will have a difficult time in getting a divorce from her and the court will give you custody of the children. See a lawyer or the Domestic Relations Court in your city. The chances are that your wife will make no protest, as evidently she wants to be free of you and the children in order to go her own wild way. At any rate, your children, who are now at the time of life when their characters are being formed and their ideals set, should be taken from the baleful influence of a mother who spends her nights away from home in drunken orgies, and from a home in which the husband and wife have such fights that the poor little children scream with fright. Have you not some relative, a mother, or aunt or cousin who would come and make a decent home for your children? If not, they will be better off in an institution than living the way they do, with no proper food or care, with no one to watch over them or discipline them or teach them manners and morals.

AGE IS RELATIVE DEAR DOROTHY DIX: I am a girl 21 and have a very responsible job as secretary to a very desirable bachelor. We have fallen in love with each other and he wants to marry me, but I hesitate because there is a difference of fifteen years in our ages. I have had lots of chances to go out with boys, but he seems to possess something that I find lacking in the other boys. He has been quite a playboy all of his life, and more or less of a drifter, but he claims he is ready to settle down now. He has a very excellent position with a large corporation and has been successful in outside business interests. Do you think I would be taking too much of a chance in marrying a man so much older than myself, or does age matter where love is concerned?

ANSWER: It depends on how you look upon age. If you are still young enough in your ideas to make fifteen years seem like an aeon of time, then don't marry your bachelor, no matter how fascinating he is or what a good chance you will always think of him as an old man, practically senile, and you will regret the young boy you didn't marry. Age is relative. Somebody answered the question, "when is a person old," by saying: "It is everybody who is ten years older than we are ourselves." And that is about as good a definition as can be given. It is never safe, when one is young, to marry anybody who seems old to you. The reason that your bachelor makes the boys you know seem flat and uninteresting is because he knows so much more of the world; he is so much more sophisticated; he is so much more polished than they are. Old men are nearly always fascinating to young girls. But, on the other hand, the very exuberance of the boys' youth, their liking to do the things that you like to do, and their interests in things that may bore the older man may make them more companionable to you than he is. Think it over well before you make a choice.

OWES GIRL AN EXPLANATION DEAR MISS DIX: I have been in love with a girl for some years and had hopes of marrying her, but I had never said anything to her about it, believing that before a man asked a woman to marry him he should be ready to offer her a wedding ring. The reason I kept silent was because my father died and left me with a dependent mother to support. Now the war comes along and I am subject to the draft, and the hope of marriage is so remote that I feel it unfair to the girl to continue to see her and thereby lessen her chances of making new acquaintances. So far some four months now I have avoided her. I know that she loves me and that she feels desperately hurt about the way I am treating her. What should I do? Before I go should I tell her about my feelings, or not? M.D.B.

ANSWER: I think you should bare your heart to her and tell her just what fine motives have kept you from asking her to marry you. You owe her that much and should not go away letting her feel that you have played with her affections and then tired of her and thrown her over for some reason she doesn't understand. 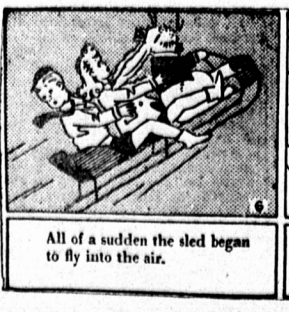

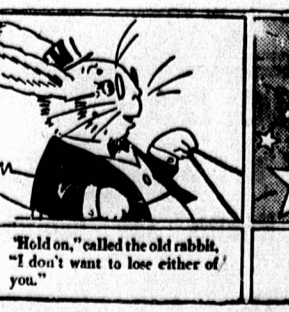

British evacuated Ebn Wood and ground near Noyelles in Cambrai area; German attacks near Compielle and La Vaqueurie beaten off. DECEMBER 5, 1917—French freighter Mont Blanc, loaded with explosives and Belgian relief ship Imo collided in Halifax harbor, resulting in explosions that killed 1,000 persons, injured 6,000 and caused damage amounting to \$35,000,000. The English Bowling Association's first champion in 1908, J. G. Carruthers still is winning. He recently took the Muswell Hill Club's championship for the 16th time in 20 final appearances.

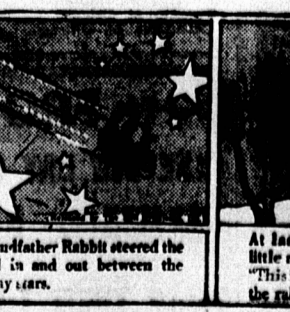

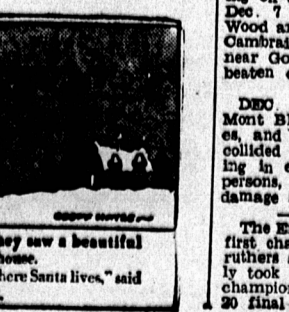
