

SOME WAYS OF MAKING TRICK PICTURE FILMS

Many people who go to witness a cinematograph entertainment are often puzzled and mystified by the projection of trick films, or, as they have been termed, "faked" pictures. Among the numerous manufacturers of the cinematograph films can be found many who adopt characteristic methods of "faking" or trick, picture films. The following are some of the most popular methods employed by manufacturers.

For lightning effect a scene is set with a back-cloth representing a very heavy and cloudy sky, and across the sky at intervals flashes of forked lightning are seen. They are produced in this way. At each side of the scene, just out of the picture, stand two "supers." Each has in his hand a whip, the lash being composed of a long, wide white ribbon. Behind the cloud-scene is another "super," who explodes magnesium ribbon, which gives in the negative a vivid flash. Simultaneously with the explosions the two "supers" flick their whips into the focus of the picture, and the result is that the white lash zigzags and curls as it is withdrawn. This gives the appearance of a really good effect when the picture is produced. White ribbon is used to produce the plainest "flash."

In a good number of films one can always see little figures, either in the act of entering a cigar-box or some other small box. A mirror is placed at one end of the studio, and the edges are draped in black to stop any stray reflections. Directly opposite to this mirror, but some distance away, a table is placed, and on this table is deposited the "property" cigar-box, which contains easily the average-sized adult. Next the actor or actress gets on the table, and climb in or out of the box, according to the effect required. The mirror, being such a distance away from the real objects, reflects them on a much smaller scale. It is the reflection that is photographed. The camera usually stands at an angle, but focused direct on the image, so that it cannot be reflected in the mirror.

Often can be seen the illusion of a man in a travelling bag. A man disappears into a bag, and re-appears at different stages of the picture. The effect is produced by means of taking the negative. When the man is seen to spring into the air and jump into the bag, the bag afterwards closing without being touched, the illusion appears to be marvellous. In reality

the man jumped on to the bag, walked away from it as he touched the ground, and someone closed the bag up. But when the negative is developed the parts where the man walked away and where another closed the bag are cut out and the film rejoined to make it appear that the man actually jumped into the bag and that it closed of its own accord.

Often, again, can be seen on the screen plates, dishes, knives, forks, etc., moving about without a hand touching them. Although this is one of the most popular illusions, and is used in a good number of so-called "haunted" films, the method of production is simple. The table is laid with the necessary articles placed upon it. At the back of the table is hung a black velvet cloth, this is to throw the china, etc., into relief. The camera operator photographs the articles as they stand, then stops. An actor pushes the articles along a fraction of an inch, withdraws his hands, and the operator photographs them again. This procedure is kept up to the end of the film, the result being that each picture shows the articles gradually moving along, while the hands that moved them, having been withdrawn when the camera was in operation, naturally do not appear in the negative.

In some of the thrilling motor-car race pictures a clever fake is resorted to to make it exciting. A car is seen to dash along the road, swing round, and to pull over, shooting the occupants out to the road. In some films the cars catch fire, and blaze away till only a heap of scrap iron is left. Just at the moment when the car approaches near the camera it stops, and the camera is shut off. The car is then jacked up from the back, photographed as it is tilted over, and it is jacked up higher and higher at each photographing. During the operation of raising the car the camera is always shut off.

Finally the car overbalances and falls over, the driver and mechanic sprawl into the road, and, as they are really waiting till the car overturns, they do not get hurt when they fall out. The effect in the actual filming is that car rushes along, overturns, and throws out the driver, etc. For the effect of the car catching fire a heap of straw is placed in the rear of the car and saturated in paraffin. This is lighted, and dense volumes of smoke arise, completely enveloping the car. The effect appears as though the car were on fire, but in reality it is only the straw. When the straw is well alight the car is removed, some old frame work and iron heaped up, the straw kicked over it, and then it is left to blaze, and the illusion appears as though the car had burned to scrap-iron. Again during the "substitution" of the iron rubbish the camera is stopped, and the operator recommences to photograph when the change has taken place.

THE RAIN GOD OF BOMBAY.

There was enacted recently a spectacle which has not been seen in Bombay for nearly half a century—a procession of Hindus to the seashore to offer prayers for rain. The god of rain was lowered into the sea, headfirst, to the accompaniment of shouts from thousands of persons.

Early in the morning a large bullock cart, gayly decorated and filled with young native tom-tom players attired in yellow robes, drove up to the entrance of the market, followed by a flower festooned palanquin, and amid the deafening noise of the band the officiating priest reverently brought out the idol and placed it gently in the palanquin, which was covered with a red umbrella.

At one point 200 children from the Lady Northcote Orphanage joined the procession, invoking the god to send rain.

When the procession was reached, Brahmins put the idol into a boat, which was taken into deep water. The idol was then lowered, headfirst into the sea.—Philadelphia North American.
