PROJECTILES VERSUS ARMOR.

It is related in history that a battle occurred at Zaganora early in the fifteenth century between opposing armies of knights encased in armor, in which battle no lives were lost except those of three knights who fell off their horses into a morass and were suffocated. This serves to demonstrate how superior was the armor to the weapons of that time. The invention of gunpowder changed all this and today the soldier goes into battle without any armor at all, for the simple reason that the modern rifle bullet would bore a hole through half a dozen of the steel clad warriors of four centuries ago. As a consequence in some modern engagements thirty per cent of those engaged have been killed or wounded on the battle field.

For years past there has been a struggle going on between war ships and cannon. In Nelson's time small cannon and big wooden ships were the rule. The ships could stand a lot of pounding and they fought at short range. But as the cannon improved the wooden walls became worthless and the iron clad warship came in. Cannon were further improved and the iron walls were pierced. Then steel took the place of iron armor and the walls became more resistant. But today there is no warship afloat whose walls can withstand the penetrating power of the projectiles from the heavy modern cannon at short range. As a consequence the modern naval battle is fought at a range which leaves the combatants separated by miles of distance. The gun has proved a victor in the contest with armor.

And to the gun has been added the still greater terror of the torpedo which is capable of destroying with a single blow

the mightiest battleship afloat. Beneath the water surface it travels and strikes where there is little or no protection of armor, although that matters little, for no armor could stand the shock caused by the explosion of one of these diabolical engines. And to the torpedo boat, whose near approach upon the surface of the water can be usually guarded against, is added the submarine torpedo boat which approaches the battleship unseen and discharges its projectile at close range. So at the present the projectiles are ahead in the race for supremacy, and it has become a grave question whether it is worth while to build any more battleships, seeing that they are about as vulnerable as the armored knights of the olden time would be before the rifleman of today. Naval constructors and governments have learned much already from the events of the war in the east and it quite possible that the results may yet prove entirely revolutionary.

THE LEGISLATIVE LIBRARY.

Mr. Crosskill as Librarian of the Legislative Assembly has labored most assiduously and skilfully under great disadvantages to make the Library available and useful to the Legislature and the general public. Very few of our citizens are aware of what has been done in cataloguing, classifying and arranging the books and keeping up-to-date the new scrap books so much appreciated by and so valuable to those who are aware of their existence, but among those few are the members of the press, to whom Mr. Crosskill has always rendered most courteous and painstaking assistance.

The present library is no doubt somewhat more extensive and valuable than many are aware. Last year 346 books and pamphlets were added, but the annual grant is far too small and ought to be increased. We are glad to find, however from the Librarian's annual report that the Library is enlarging its sphere of usefulness from year to year, that there are increased numbers of applications for reading and loaning privileges, and that many requests for historical and other information are received and answered by mail. All of which means work for the busy Librarian and his assistants.

In several ways the prorogation gives a sense of relief. Members are doubtless desirous to return home and attend to the pressing business of the season. The hotels will have a little more room for transient guests. The newspapers will have a good deal more room for general news. And members of Government will be relieved from having to answer all sorts of questions from the Opposition benches. Of course The Patriot's readers may imagine that Premier Peters is still delivering his budget, but that will be a delusion. It was delivered twelve days ago.

Passengers from the mainland on Saturday complain that they could not find out anything along the line of the Intercolonial as to the movements of steamers to and from the Island. The prevalent idea seemed to be that the winter steamers were still plying. Surely both the Government and the Navigation Company ought to take an interest in having the movements of steamers made public. We also learn that there is a large accumulation at Pictou of freight for the Island, more than the Princess is likely to overtake for a good while to come.

THE SESSION.

Five weeks is not a very long time for a Provincial Legislature to be in session and we fail to see the force of The Examiner's objection taken on that ground, especially as in almost all cases, in our own as well as in other Legislatures, it is usually, the Opposition that prevent an earlier prorogation than is had. It is also to be observed in regard to the paucity of measures complained of by the Examiner, that no legislation at all is better than bad legislation, and as most of what a Liberal Government may have to propose is bad from The Examiner's point of view, our contemporary might fairly rejoice that so little was done. Possibly, too, it might be found on close examination that most of the Canadian Provinces have suffered more in the past from over-legislation than from the lack of legislation.

But these considerations cover only half the ground. If more good and useful measures were needed why did not the members of the Opposition propose them? The fact of a member sitting on the Opposition side by no means relieves him from the responsibility of putting forward any measure he can for the good of the country. If the measures offered were too few, why did not the Opposition add to their number other ones, and better ones if those offered were faulty or objectionable? We realize that the Opposition are in the minority, and might not always be able to bring the majority to their way of thinking. But had they offered more and better measures than were put forward on the Government side the country would have been quick to give them credit. This they did not do. The large majority of the bills submitted and passed into law emanated from the ministerial side of the House.
