Navy Win Second Straight Encounter

Scoring Splurge By "Tars" In Final Minutes Send Saints Down To A 9-5 Defeat

Shooting four goals in the last eight minutes of the game Navy last night chalked up their second straight victory in the Commercial Service League as they sent Saint Dunstan's down to a 9-5 defeat in another brilliant lightning fast struggle played at the Forum.

Having a big edge in speed Saints twice during the encounter had a one goal lead but couldn't stem the counter attacks the winners threw at them. Bert Steele shot the Saints into the lead before the six minute mark of the first period had been reached but before the session had ended the "Tars" had taken a 2-1 lead on goals by Leith Jay and Wilf Whalen.

For over 14 minutes of the middle canto as both teams tore into each other with everything they had the score remained unchanged until Jack Coyle shooting the first of three goals he scored during the encounter, put the Saints back on even terms on a pass from Bert Steele. Wilf Whalen got his second goal of the night less than two minutes later as he went in all alone to draw the Saints goal out and score cleanly; again the Navy were in front but it was shortlived as Coyle and Steele combined once more for a counter. Coyle put the Saints back on a pass at the line but when Steele's shot missed its mark Coyle was there to backhand the rebound behind McLennis.

The fans had plenty of excitement all through a roughly-fought third period. Players' tempers were becoming a little frayed due to the closeness of the game and body checks galore in all zones were being handed out. It took the Saints just 30 seconds to take the lead for the second time in the game as Coyle bagged a brace three as he went in all alone. Bruce Chandler got that one back for his Navy teammates less than two minutes later to knot the count at 4-4. Blaquiere was serving time in the penalty box as Ev Jay broke at his own blue line to go right in and again put the "Tars" in the lead; there was less than 10 minutes to go when Saints tied it up once more; Ev Jay had drawn a 10-minute slashing penalty and Grant of the Saints five, as both players tangled briefly

and it seemed with the Navy due to play the remainder of the game short-handed as if the Saints would get the break they were looking for. The officers had scarcely been seated in sinners avenue when Steele got his second goal of the game on a pass from Chris Gallant to make the count read 6-5 but here the climax of the game was reached as the Navy threw on the pressure. Eddie Darragh shot them into a 6-5 lead on a pass from Cudmore at the 13 minute mark and in the next six minutes Leith Jay, Whalen and Cudmore all broke through for goals to make certain of a Navy victory. Saints were in scoring position on more than one occasion but poor marksmanship around the nets cost them at least two goals when they appeared to have the hard-worked Navy goal at their mercy.

Although the attendance was disappointing to say the least nevertheless the "faithful" who did take in the encounter saw two teams fight tooth and nail all the way. Saints although defeated led one of the fastest skating teams ever to represent the University while the Navy once again showed that they have plenty of fight and will take a lot of beating from any team in the league. Saints last night were led by swivel-hipped Jack Coyle, incurably footed Bert Steele and rugged Vince Grant. Coyle and Steele looked after the scoring end for the Saints while Wilf Whalen with three goals led the Navy snipers; Leith Jay had two while the rest were evenly distributed.

Amerks Take Black Hawks To Cleaners

NEW YORK, Dec. 12—New York Americans, with ambling Neils Stewart netting a goal just 15 seconds after his first appearance of the season, scored a 4-0 National Hockey League victory tonight over Chicago Black Hawks. The victory put the Americans into a sixth-place tie with Detroit Red Wings.

The season's smallest crowd, less than 5,000, saw the game. Stewart, the "Ole Poison" of a dozen seasons who came out of a brief retirement to aid the crippled Amerks, took the puck the first time on the ice and banged home one of the goals—the 318th of his career.

Besides Stewart, the Americans had Doc Romnes, recovered from a broken hand for their forward line and Pat Eagan and Chuck Shannon, from Springfield Indians, operating as a unit on defence.

Eddie Wiseman was the spark plug of the victory. Wiseman fired the Amerks' first and third goals and made the play for Johnny Sorrell's in the last period.

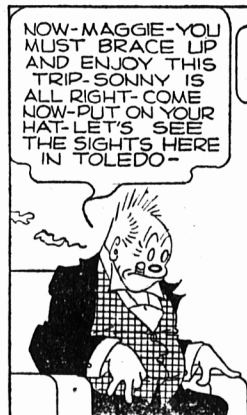

through the press and censorship bureau.

Captain Fitzroy, speaker of the House of Commons, warned members they even had to talk about what happens. The session will be devoted to the subject of supply and the speakers will include Prime Minister Chamberlain, Leslie Burgin, the supply minister, Sir Archibald Sinclair, Liberal leader, Clement Attlee, Labor leader, Arthur Greenwood, deputy Labor leader, David Lloyd George and pass by the three defence ministers, Winston Churchill, Leslie Hore-Belisha and Sir Kingsley Wood.

Heavy Toll Of Nazis

Sir Kingsley told the House British Hurr-cane and Spitfire planes have shown a "decisive advantage" over German craft and that British "flier" squadrons had taken a heavy toll of Nazis who "tried to cross our air defence."

Even more encouraging is the knowledge of superiority they have shown over German fighters he declared. "Not only have they twice the gun power of the Messer chmitt (German fighter) planes but they have markedly better flying characteristics."

Sir Kingsley said Polish squadrons would be reformed under Polish officers and attached to the R. A. F.

In 57 attacks by the coastal air command on submarines, "19 cases we can be sure that substantial damage has been caused," he said.

Fear Only Vanguard

Sir John Simon said the "comprehensive" agreement announced today between Britain and France knits the two countries in the domain of finance as they are already united in the spheres of military and economic operations.

Exposure Kills Many

VIIIPURI, Finland, Dec. 12—(CP HAVAS) Soviet forces trying to strike at the Katian Isthmus port from north of Lake Ladoga are losing two men by exposure for every one by Finnish bullets, red prisoners brought here, reports tonight.

Ill-equipped Russian troops are forced to spend nights in the open with the temperatures at 10 to 20 below zero, they said, and have had to give up building fires after dark because Finnish planes bomb them. Tents are available only for Soviet officers, they said, and retreating Finns have destroyed all buildings that might afford shelter.

Some of the prisoners giving this information wore light summer tunics under their heavy winter overcoats. Many wore defective shoes and rags wrapped around their feet instead of socks.

Bruins Tie For Top Place In League

BOSTON, Dec. 12—(CP)—Boston Bruins went into a tie tonight with the idle Toronto Maple Leafs at the top of the National Hockey League standing by defeating Detroit Red Wings 3-1 for the sixth straight loss suffered by the motor city squad.

The Bruins triumph cost them the services of Roy Conacher, brilliant left winger, for at least six weeks.

Conacher suffered a fractured left wrist early in the second period after he collided head-on with Jimmie Orlando in the centre zone. As he left for hospital, Manager Art Ross summoned Red Hamill one of the Bruins' farm hands on the Hershey International-American League club, to join the Bruins in Toronto Thursday.

Although they never led, the Red Wings waged a furious battle from bell to bell. Jack Shewchuck, rookie defenceman put the Bruins out front in the opening period.

Carl Liscombe moved the Wings up to even terms in the second period, with Mud Bruneteau and Don Deacon assisting, and the action remained deadlocked until the final period. With Jack Stewart off, Herb Cain rapped in the clincher, and, to make victory doubly sure, Mel (Sudden Death) Hill added a third tally.

Tic Williams Saves Day For Millionaires

OTTAWA, Dec. 12—(CP)—It is about to spend money and resources in the enemy outside the country while allowing enemies within to impair the national effort, in the opinion of attorney-general Conant of Ontario, who spoke to the Canadian Club today.

Mr. Conant said Ontario had invoked the defence of Canada regulations to deal with all subversive elements.

"So far as the government of Ontario is concerned, we will do everything in our power to put these people where they belong," he declared. "Whether they be Communists, Fascists or others we will suppress the subversive forces."

If necessary the strength of the provincial force would be increased. Speaking in the presence of Prime Minister MacKenzie King, the Ontario attorney-general said he personally believed the federal government had succeeded so far in organizing Canada's manpower and resources in the most efficient possible manner for prosecution of the war.
