### Hanson Urges More Realistic War Attitude

Proposes appointment of select committee sitting constantly to examine war expenditures.

OTTAWA, Dec. 3.—(CP)—Conservative House Leader Hanson, speaking in the House of Commons, today charged the government with a total failure to adopt and promote a more realistic attitude toward the war.

Throughout ministerial speeches during the war, Hanson said, there has been "most subtle evidence of propaganda" and an attempt to "fill the people into a false sense of security."

Mr. Hanson suggested the appointment of a parliamentary committee on "currents expenditure" to examine war expenditures. He proposed a select committee sitting constantly to examine war expenditures.

### They'll Never Fall Into Enemy Hands



Canada is to get 144 speedy Vultee combat planes, originally ordered by the Swedish government, it was announced at Ottawa. Delivery is to take place immediately. Sweden ordered the planes from the Vultee Aircraft Corp., but the U.S. subsequently refused to grant an export license, presumably because they might fall into enemy hands. Government officials here described the Vultee as "a fighter ship," but declined to reveal where they would be used.
