RELIGIOUS SERVICES

ST. PETER'S CATHEDRAL The services at St. Peter's Cathedral yesterday were at the usual hours 8 and 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. At the 11 o'clock service the Cope, Eucharistic Vestments and Altar hangings were of red, these together with the red and white Coronation decorations made a pretty setting for the observance of the Festival of Whit Sunday. Rev. Canon Malone was celebrant and preached from the words "Spirit and Bride" The Bride is the Church, which ministers through the Bible, Creeds, Apostolic Ministry and the Sacraments. At the close of this service Lieut. Colonel P. S. Fielding, who has found it necessary on account of increased work in his public office to resign the position of Organist, was presented with an address and silver salver by the congregation, which he suitably acknowledged.

ST. JAMES CHURCH "The Simplicity of Religion" was the subject of the morning sermon by the Rev. Dr. J. Keir Fraser. One finds simplicity running right through the life of Christ. So it is with his religion. In these days we are prone to confuse religion with theology which is only the definition of religion, or with ritual which is only an outer covering fashioned by man. But true religion is the core of simplicity itself resting simply and surely on faith hope and love. The subject of the evening sermon was "The Glory of the Communion." Like Naaman the leper, we are all apt to be irritated by the commonplace. Much of the sin, sorrow, and anxieties of middle age life come from our dislike of the ordinary things repeated over and over. But let us remember that the very warp and woof of life is a preparation for greater things, and if we are faithful over the little matters we will be able to handle greater things; finally, our Lord Jesus Christ himself, gloried in the commonplace. The music consisted of an anthem "Rejoice in the Lord"; the evening anthem, "Seek Ye the Lord" with solo by Mrs. J. A. Lawson.

ST. DUNSTAN'S BASILICA The Feast of Pentecost was observed yesterday at St. Dunstan's Basilica. High Mass was celebrated by Rev. William McCabe with Rev. W. McCordie as deacon and Rev. R. McKenzie as sub-deacon. The Veni Sanctus Spiritus, the music of which was composed by Neukorn, was sung by Mr. William Brown, choir director. This is the 27th consecutive year that Mr. Brown has sung this hymn on Pentecost Sunday. It was sung first in Charlottetown on May 5th, 1876, and has been sung each year since. At 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon the Sacrament of Confirmation was administered by the Bishop to 200 children after which the Bishop addressed the children and their sponsors.
