GOVERNMENT WINS IN BYE-ELECTIONS

Wigmore Defeats Dr. Emery by Over 4,000 and Latter Loses Deposit. McCurdy Has Majority of 1,500 Over Independent Farmer Opponent.

(Special to The Guardian.) ST. JOHN, Sept. 20.—Supported by a strong vote from the women, Hon. R. W. Wigmore, Minister of Customs and Inland Revenue was returned to the Meighen Cabinet today with a large majority over his opponent, Dr. A. F. Emery of St. John.

SINN FEINERS' BOLD DASH FOR ARMS AND MUNITIONS

Hold up Pleasure Seekers at Point of Revolver and Compel Them to Take Raiders on Hunt for Arms.

(Special to The Guardian.) BELFAST, Sept. 20.—With twenty automobiles captured from week-end pleasure seekers the Sinn Feiners on Saturday carried out one of the biggest raids for arms in the history of Ireland.

DUBLIN, Sept. 20.—Major General Sir Nevill MacCreedy's coup yesterday in which he surprised a body of Sinn Fein troops at drill and captured forty men was regarded here today as the first step in a new campaign to smash the Irish Republican Army. The coup was taken as an indication that MacCreedy intends to take the initiative against the Sinn Feiners, rather than pursue the former policy of waiting for aggression.

LIMERICK, IRELAND, Sept. 20.—The constabulary patrol was ambuscaded near Abbeyfeale on Sunday. Constable Mahoney was killed and Chief Constable and another constable were wounded.

BELFAST, Sept. 20.—Soldiers who have been in ambush since early morning surprised a body of Sinn Feiners at bombing practice in the hills today. One Republican was killed, two injured and thirty-five captured.

Russian Sailors Defy Bolsheviks

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, September 18.—Refugees arriving today from Heligoland report that sailors at Petrograd refused to obey the Bolshevik mobilization orders and that nearly one hundred were executed.

Explosion Victims Now Number 35

Fisher, a one time employee of the French Commission was arrested in Hamilton, Ont., in connection with the explosion and postcards received by brokers warning them of the coming disaster. Many things point to Fisher knowing something about the explosion and the prisoner is adjudged insane.

SHOCKING TRAGEDY IN NOVA SCOTIA HAMLET

Havelock Veinot Enraged Over Dispute Over a Dam Shot and Killed His Father, Three Neighbors and Himself.

HALIFAX, Sept. 20.—A shocking and horrible tragedy occurred at Sampsons Corner, near New Jersey, this morning when Havelock Veinot became enraged over a dispute concerning the right to a dam on his father's farm and shot and killed his father, Archibald Ritchie, his wife and Abner Snyder, the latter three being neighbors with whom the victims had a dispute over the dam. He then turned the gun on himself and ended his life.

THE NEW YORK MYSTERY IS NOT YET SOLVED

Detectives Following Many Clues but so Far Without Result. Russian Journalist Held on Suspicion.

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—The Dept. of Justice agents and the police are still without a definite clue to the identity of the person or persons responsible for Thursday's explosion on Wall St. Alexander Iralovsky, Russian Journalist, who was arrested late yesterday in information furnished by an anonymous correspondent and who admitted having been in the financial district a short time after the explosion occurred is still being held without bail on a charge of being an undesirable alien.

Delegates will gather for the main conference in the hall of the Black Headed Knights. It was the gathering place for wealthy and noble Russians and still is decorated with pictures and symbols of old days.
