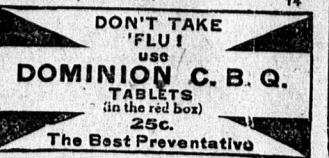

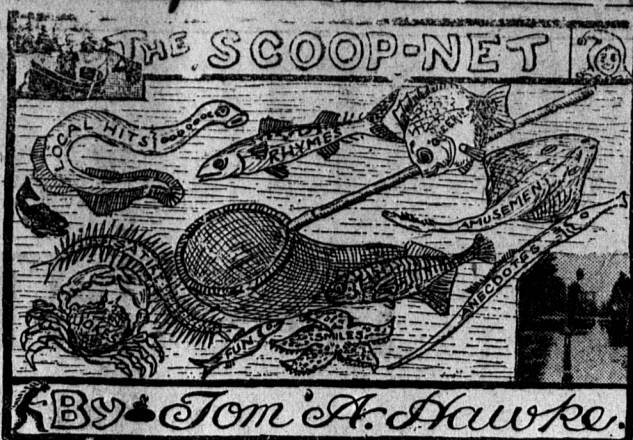
"It is done, now, and we cannot do anything. But, Sandra, I am disappointed that you had not enough confidence in my judgment to let me know what was going on."

Prince Edward Island Hospital Annual Collection

In accordance with the promise made a year ago, no appeal of any kind in behalf of the Prince Edward Island Hospital has been made or has been authorized during the year by the Trustees. The time has now arrived, however, when we must have the liberal financial support of the people of Queens and Kings counties, if we are to continue to maintain and increase the efficiency of the hospital, without increasing largely the rates of paying patients, and reducing our free accommodation for those who are unable to pay. A number of copies of our last annual report have been sent to the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in every school district, and we would like to have this report carefully read by everyone.

Outstanding Features of the Work.

- 1. The number of people served by the Hospital, by far the largest in our history, shows the imperative need of more accommodation and equipment.
2. The increased cost of everything used in the Hospital,—Coal increased \$1,892.70; groceries, \$1,482.42; medicine, \$804.14; meat and fish, \$321.78, or an increase of \$4,500, on four items alone.
3. Salaries reduced \$476.76.
4. The very liberal support given the Hospital by the majority of the people which alone made it possible for us to "carry on."

The few figures given herewith will show you that the difference between receipts and expenditures will be greater this year than last and that your strong support is necessary. Further, new equipment is constantly required if we are to keep the Hospital in the first class and a credit to the province. A contagious disease ward is something we should provide at once and we can do so only if we get your generous support.

In accordance with the Trustees' Report of last year, we are now asking the people of Queens and Kings counties to give us the assistance needed. Outside of Charlottetown the collections are being made through the School Trustees, who have been asked to appoint collectors to call on the people of their district beginning November first. In Charlottetown, the collections will be made by envelopes which will be left at every house on Friday and Saturday, October 31st and November 1st, and will be taken up on the following Monday.

The Trustees wish to urge as follows:—

To the School Trustees—Please see you get good collectors and start them out promptly.

To the Citizens of Charlottetown—Have your envelopes ready for the collectors on Monday, morning, November 3rd.

And to Everybody—Give according to your ability. The cause is a good one. All monies received will go to make someone a little more comfortable, and give them a better chance for life. That someone might be you.
