

Small Crowd Sees Rangers Defeat Chicago; Detroit Edges Boston

Exhibition Fight

CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 7.—(AP)—Joe Louis tonight knocked out San Francisco's Pat Valentino in the eighth round of their scheduled 10-round exhibition in the Chicago Stadium.

Louis, weighing about 224 to 185 for Valentino, obviously let the heavy California heavyweight last until the eighth — the round in which Edward Charles, the N.B.A. champion, had knocked out Valentino in their match in San Francisco last Oct. 14. Then Louis backed his foe into the ropes and walloped knockout punches.

The finish came in 2:56 of the eighth.

DETROIT 2, BOSTON 1

BOSTON, Dec. 7.—(CP)—The pace-setting Detroit Red Wings protected their National Hockey League undefeated record game string by eking out a 2-1 victory over Boston Bruins in lively fashion tonight before a 16,103 crowd at the Boston Garden. While the Bruins were bowing for the first time in seven home starts, they lost two players, Pete Horeck and Dave Creighton, who went off with leg injuries.

Horeck, obtained from the Red Wings this season, suffered a deep gash below his right ankle when boarded by Babando late in the first period. It is believed that one of Babando's skates caused the serious injury — the severance of all tendons about the post-tibial arteries.

Creighton had to retire during the second period with a bashed right knee. Quackenbush was cut on the nose by a high stick late in the game but returned after receiving two stitches.

Army, Ray's Capture Basketball Games; In Tie With S. D. U. for Lead

Army and Ray's moved into a three-cornered tie for first place with Saint Dunstan's University in Island Physical Fitness Basketball League competition last night when they merged the winners of a double hoop bill at the Prince of Wales auditorium.

The Army hoopers edged out the Summerside Schurman's quintette by the slim margin of three points to win out by a 37-34 count in the first encounter, while Ray's Millionaires took a commanding 61-42 victory over the Prince of Wales College hoopers. Both games came up with some close overplay, with the second game in particular, being a very clearly played encounter when only a total of 20 fouls were handed out.

FIRST GAME

The opening tilt saw Army come from behind a four-point deficit at the end of the first half to out-point Schurman's 21 to 14 for the final victory. Schurman's looked like a winning team in the first half when they did some nice ball-handling and smart shooting to go into an early lead, but by the time the half was reached the Army closed the gap to trail by a score of 16-20. Getting all out in the final frame, the Army soon overhauled the West-landers and in a really nip-and-tuck battle for the rest of the game that could have ended as anybody's victory, the Army finally emerged with a slim three-point edge.

Earl Smith of Schurman's was the big pointgetter of the game with a total of 22, while George MacLellan and Joe Cullen of Army were next in line with 11 and 10 respectively. The game was pretty rough in places, with Army chalking up 22 fouls and Schurman's 17. Rossier of Army went out with five fouls in the first half, while teammate G. MacLellan went out with five in the second. Linkletter of Schurman's fouled out with five in the final half.

SECOND GAME

Holding their own well in the opening half of the second game, the Prince of Wales Welshmen exhibited some smart play against the strong Ray's aggregation to come from behind an early scoring spree trailed by the opposition to only trail by one point at the end of the half. But the Ray's hoopers really strutted their stuff in the final half to see LePage, O'Connor and Lambert bang in basket after basket to roll up a big score, and out-point their opponents by a 40-25 margin for a decided 61-42 victory. The game was well played and very clean, however, and despite the lopsided score, the College crew showed plenty of style and promise.

Walter LePage of Ray's was the sharpshooter of the game with a total of 19 points, while teammates O'Connor and Lambert ran him a close second and third with 16 and 15 points respectively. Howak and MacLean were the big scorers for the Collegians with 16 and 12 in that order.

Ray's had 12 fouls called against them while P.W.C. only had eight, with neither team having a man foul out with the necessary five.

Williams Fined \$500, Ordered To Apologize

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 7.—(AP)—For yelling "fix" and then admitting he didn't know the source of the charge, lightweight champion Ike Williams today was fined \$500 by the Pennsylvania Athletic Commission for actions "deleterious to boxing."

In addition, the Trenton, N. J. Negro was ordered to write "strong apologies" to commission members and three officials who judged his lightweight title fight Monday night with Chicago's Freddy Dawson.

Williams, in a pre-fight statement, told reporters "a good friend" had warned him the fight was "in the bag" for Dawson unless he was won by a knockout. It turned out that Williams won a unanimous decision in a 15-round fight that was dull but close all the way.

Commission chairman George Jones, in an open hearing today, prodded Williams to name the "friend" who had given him the "fix" information.

Again and again Williams insisted: "I don't know who phoned me. He wouldn't tell me his name and I didn't recognize the voice." Williams is under suspension by the National Boxing Association — of which Pennsylvania is a member — for failing to fulfill a fight contract in California.

The N.B.A. permitted Williams to fight Dawson since the bout here was signed before the suspension went into effect.

Williams had been a 12-to-5 betting favorite to beat Dawson in early fight forecasts but Monday the odds dropped as low as 7-1-2 to 5 with plenty of support for Dawson.

Williams had fought Dawson three times previously, winning twice and earning a draw.
